Monday, March 29, Ak-Chin various consultations Tribal Council hosted its second monthly Community Meeting via WebEx. Council and community members gathered virtually to learn about the latest updates within the community.

Opening the March meeting was Vice Chairman Lemuel Vincent, as he began by greeting the community then turning it to Councilmember Delia Carlyle to say a blessing before getting started with council updates.

First to give updates, Vice Chairman Vincent talked about how the Maricopa Pantry is doing good within the community and hopes it will continue to help the community. He thanked the departments who have helped with the distributions that have been held every Monday in March, and thanked the members who came out to take advantage of the distributed food goods.

Next, Councilmember talked about Carlyle the Consultation Tribal and Strengthening Nation-to-Nation Relationships and

that have been coming in since the memorandum was passed in January of this year by President Biden. The memorandum mandates federal departments to reach out and consult with tribes on varying issues and engage in meaningful consultations when developing policies that affect Tribal Nations.

Councilmember Lisa Garcia talked about assisting with both community and employee testing blitz events. She shared information on the first vaccination event held in the community on Thursday, March 25, saying there were 108 community for coordinating the testing members who received their COVID vaccines. She also shared information on the vaccination eligibility being lowered to age 16, informing that appointments will need to be scheduled for the underage as consent forms will be need to be signed.

Garcia addressed meetings on the roads, right of way projects and various issues self-governance and with budgets. She acknowledged the incident management team



and vaccination events, and thanked departments for helping to coordinate and host these events.

Chairman Robert Miguel talked about how busy council had been with meetings, via zoom, WebEx, and in-person. He shared on his meeting with U.S. House of Representatives, Mark Mullin, from Oklahoma, and their tour of the community, and Congresswoman Debra Haaland and her new appointment.

Chairman talked about meeting with Gila River Tribal Council about flood damage at Southern Dunes, in which both communities are working together to help clear out the back-up causing the floods. He also talked about his meetings with AIGA, and promos with the Arizona Chamber of Commerce, as well as meeting with Maricopa Unified School Superintendent Dr. Lopeman about building a better relationship to ensure community students are getting the help they need.

Lastly, Chairman talked about meeting with the community enterprises and moving forward in a safe manner with the lifting of guidelines Governor by Ducey. Chairman Miguel closed with thanking the community for participating in virtual meetings.

After Chairman had finished up with his updates, the meeting was opened up for questions. Members submitted questions through email to Council Secretary Vicki

a year since the first closure here in the Center. Elders went home and didn't come back.

I remember the announcement and how scared we all felt sending them home after lunch.

Our department continued to serve and deliver meals but the center isn't the same. The halls echo and we all miss the voices and chatter at breakfast and lunch. We've grieved and worried for every Elder.

I can honestly say that sitting in my office "social distancing" has been one of the loneliest experiences I've ever felt. It has been depressing and difficult to come in. I know I'm not alone, all the other employees here feel the same. Somehow it makes it a little easier to know you're not the only one feeling this way.

In an effort to brighten my office and breathe some life back into our department I brought in a cutting from a plant that belonged to my Aunt.

Over the last few months that plant has taken over my office. It's a jungle in here! Its deep Red leaves have covered the window and stretched across my desk. I've cut it back dozens of times and there are new plants on everyone's desk.

I know it lifted my mood and helped to make my office feel more welcoming. I recently

This is one of Candace's plants that she has in her office. It is called a Wizard Red Velvet Coleus.

reached out to see if any other employees would like a cutting.

It's an easy plant to grow. I use a water wicking system so that if I'm away for an extended period of time the plant never suffers for water. It basically uses exactly what it needs.

I place a string 'wick' next to the plants roots and down through the bottom of the planting pot. Then put water

in the lower pan and the wick does the work of getting the moisture up to the plant. The plant gets exactly what it needs when it needs it and thrives.

I've used this watering technique for years and have always had beautiful plants both inside and outside my home.

There are many studies out there about the benefits of plants. Studies have also

This is the picture of my Aunt's plant that I've kept alive for the last 4 years since she passed. The wicking system has been a plant saver! This plant is in a Halloween witches pot! And I just put a bowl under it with the string. Each time we go up I add about a gallon of water. Some of

the leaves are as big as a dinner plate!

All tribal enrolled members of the GRIC and Ak-Chin communities, 16 years old and older, and residents of their households are eligible for the vaccine. This includes GRIC and Ak-Chin tribal enrolled urban members and residents of their household.

### As of March 29, 2021. Appointments ONLY at Hu Hu Kam Memorial Hospital and Komatke Health Center Primary Care Department

- Eligible 16 and 17 year olds can now receive the Pfizer vaccine with the consent of a parent or guardian.
- Please provide proof of tribal membership or residency i.e. mail with name and address indicated.
- Coming soon! Look for additional Pfizer vaccine clinics in the Community.

### How To Schedule an Appointment:

# What is a SANE or Forensic Nurse?

A SANE or Forensic Nurse is a Registered Nurse who is specially trained to provide comprehensive care to victims of trauma/violence and who demonstrates competency in performing a medical forensic exam. A SANE/Forensic Nurse is specifically trained to identify and document injuries caused by trauma. A SANE has knowledge of the neurobiology of trauma – basically the effects of trauma on the brain. This allows the SANE to provide quality trauma informed care for each patient.

SANE stands for Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner. This title is a little deceiving, as SANE's also do medical forensic exams for victims of domestic or interpersonal violence, strangulation, abuse, neglect, and trafficking, as well as suspect exams. Our SANE team does acute as well as delayed disclosure medical forensic exams. Even if it has been several years, we still want to see all victims!

We also provide services for adults who do not want law enforcement involved. We have many options available to help victims of these crimes even if they don't want to make a formal report. We can provide an exam, STI prophylaxis. The exception to this obviously, is any case that would be a mandatory report. (Minors, children.)

# **Potential Indicators of Sexual Abuse**

## **Physical indications:**

- Sleep disturbances
- Bedwetting
- · Pain or irritation in genital area
- Difficulty walking or sitting
- Difficulty urinating
- Pregnancy
- Positive testing for sexually transmitted infection or HIV
- Excessive or injurious masturbation
- Excessive fear of being touched
- · Refusal to go to a certain place or be with a certain person
- Clinging, whining
- Increase in physical complaints
- Excessive bathing
- Reluctance to undress for physical education classes

For more information, please contact us at: SANE Clinic at 520-562-5151 or email sane@grhc.org In order to become a forensic nurse, an RN must complete a 40 hour didactic course and be signed off on a preceptorship to do medical forensic exams. This process must be done for the adult/ adolescent population, and again for pediatrics.

To become certified, the Forensic Nurse Examiner must complete 300 hours of practice (for adult/adolescent and again for pediatric) to sit for the exam. Once they have passed one or both exams, they can use the credentials SANE-A and/or SANE-P.

## **Behavioral indications:**

- Sexually promiscuous, or inappropriate sexual behavior
- Developmental age-inappropriate sexual play and/or drawings
- · Fear of being alone
- Regression to more infantile behavor such as wetting, thumbsucking, fecal soiling
- · Change in appetite, eating disorders
- · Cruelty to others
- Cruelty to animals
- Acting out and attention getting behavior such as shoplifting, stealing, fire setting
- Anxious
- Withdrawn, isolation from peers or other changes in behavior
- Grades in school may drop, difficulty concentrating & learning
- Alcohol / drug abuse
- · Attraction to older men or dislike of men
- Chronic running away
- Poor self-image reflected in dress, cleanliness, appearance
- Depression, physical self-abuse, suicide attempts / threats
