50 YEARS OF EARTH DAY!

This year, April 22nd marks the 50th anniversary of Earth Day! In the spring of 1970, U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson was looking for someone to organize a national teach-in about environmentalism. He met environmental activist Denis Hayes, who turned the teach-in into the first Earth Day, on April 22nd, 1970.

The teach-in attracted more than 20 million people across the U.S. and gave birth to the modern environmental movement now known as "Earth Day".

Virtually overnight, things like burning rivers, pesticides and vanishing bird species were tragedies people cared about. Earth Day was created as a way to bring environmental issues forward into the national spotlight. Today, Earth Day is celebrated by millions of people across the world.

Since that first Earth Day in 1970, the U.S. including tribal nations have made tremendous progress improving air quality, cleaning up contaminated lands, and protecting our Ak-Chin water resources. EPD's Environmental Programs' mission is, "To protect, preserve and restore Community's natural resources through monitoring assessments and and enforcement of Environmental

Ordinances" and our Mantra is

"Respect the Environment."

Environmental Programs goal is always to "Make Every Day Earth Day!".

EPD Environmental Programs mascot, Earthy Enos, first came to life around 2005 or 2006. Earthy Enos was the brainchild of Ashlea Anderson, EPD's previous Air Quality Specialist.

Ashlea wanted to create a character that the Community could identify with and remember. She wanted the character to be an advocate for the Earth, hence his first name, "Earthy".

"Earthy" was a good start but he needed a last name to round out his character, and after several name changes, his name became "Earthy Enos".

"Enos" is a last name known in the Community and at the time, Terry Enos, who previously worked for EPD, was a Tribal Council Member and previous Chairman. So, Terry Enos had a slight influence on Earthy's last name.

Earthy Enos was created as part of an effort to provide education and outreach to the youth in the Ak-Chin Indian Community. When thinking about a character that would be memorable and interesting, Ashlea Anderson also wanted him to be relatable to the



Community. So Ashlea first took a stick-figure drawing to Him Dak Graphic Artist Waylon Antone.

Her pencil drawing was complete with small "x's" for braids and a feather at the top of Earthy's head.

Ashlea asked Waylon to transform her stick-figure idea into a character and what Waylon Antone drew was the perfect fit!

The cartoon version of Earthy was created with long braids and a shirt with a picture of the Earth on the front. There were only a couple tweaks here and there, but for the most part, the first Earthy Enos cartoon that Waylon created remains with the Community today.

Earthy Enos had his "real-life" debut in a skit Ashlea Anderson created for the Environmental Protection Department to perform at an Earth Day event. Earthy's tag line, "Stop, and think about it!", was created as part of the dialogue between Earthy and some unknowingly Earth harming citizens played by the Environmental Protection staff.

The character of Earthy was brought to life by then

Environmental Orona. Manager, Roman During each incident Earthy encountered during the skit, which included things like illegal dumping, burning, pesticides and oil disposal, Earthy would approach the offender and say, "Stop, and think about it!", to help get the message across that each action has consequences; sometimes consequences are positive, other times negative.

After the skit, a video was produced based on the skit performance and the video was shown at Community events and the awareness of Earthy continued to grow. As Earthy and the video made more appearances at special events, Earthy became more of a "member" of the Community and the Environmental Protection Department.

Earthy has traveled with the EPD to Environmental conferences nationwide and was even involved in a national competition for the character itself.

Earthy has also been the star

of his own coloring book and calendar that were produced by EPD Environmental Programs to help spread environmental awareness. Earthy's activity books have been distributed to the Ak-Chin Indian Community and other tribal communities. Earthy also appears on many of EPD's Earth Day t-shirts.

In 2013, Ak-Chin Environmental Protection Dept. Director Brenda Ball using USEPA grant funding, commissioned a mascot to be constructed based off of one of the original cartoon drawings by Waylon Antone.

Hogtown Mascots, Inc. of Ontario, Canada built the Earth mascot. Earthy continues to travel with the Environmental **Programs** staff to tribal environmental events across the U.S. and has even raced other tribal mascots such as Gila River Indian Community's Caution Coyote, Enviro Kid and Salt River Pima Maricopa Indian Community's Clean Air Bunny.

part to protect the community. I encourage all Arizonans who haven't been vaccinated yet to roll up their sleeves and get the vaccine as soon as they can."

As of today, 4,032,557 doses of COVID-19 vaccine have been administered statewide to 2,529,589 individuals, including 1,655,985 who have been fully vaccinated.

"We are approaching a point where half of Arizona's adult population will have received at least one dose," said Dr. Cara Christ, director of the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS).

"With vaccine supply approaching demand, we need everyone's help to keep up this momentum and get to

the point where everyone is protected against COVID-19."

State-run vaccination sites have administered 1,145,551 doses of COVID-19 vaccine to date, with more sites to come.

On Monday, April 19, a vaccination site opens at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, while a site serving the North Valley is set to open Thursday, April 22, at WestWorld in Scottsdale.

Governor Ducey and ADHS yesterday announced a partnership with Coconino County, Northern Arizona University (NAU), and Northern Arizona Healthcare to open a state COVID-19 vaccination site in Flagstaff. The indoor vaccination site at NAU's University Union

Fieldhouse will launch Monday, April 19 and operate seven days a week from 7 a.m.-5 p.m.

Information about all vaccination sites across Arizona can be found at azhealth.gov/findvaccine.

At 11 a.m. every Friday, ADHS makes appointments available at state-run sites of the following week. Registration for these and many other sites is available at podvaccine. azdhs.gov or by calling 844-542-8201 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., 7 days a week. Both resources offer assistance in English and Spanish.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS FOR VALUATION FOR A **RIGHT-OF-WAY ACROSS** TRIBAL TRUST LAND FOR THE AK-CHIN INDIAN COMMUNITY

The Ak-Chin Indian Community ("Community") Planning and Development Department ("Planning Department") is seeking an experienced professional and unbiased opinion of value from valuation services and/or land appraisal firms to assist the Community in negotiations regarding the overall valuation of a Right-of-Way ("ROW") across tribal trust land within and adjacent to an existing Arizona Department of Transportation ("ADOT") ROW. The ROW's purpose is to build out a section of water line to a larger service area that does not include the Community, via the construction of a new 16-inch water pipeline which will traverse Community land. The Community desires a full and complete valuation of the ROW considering all relevant valuation factors, including but not limited to the purpose and value of the water pipeline and its location in front of and connecting major entertainment/leisure venues.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The utility company proposes to place a water main on the northern edge of the undeveloped ADOT ROW. The easement corridor measures approximately 15-foot wide and a mile in length located between State Route 238-mile marker 40.95 and mile marker 42.02, encompassing approximately 81,443 square feet or 1.8 acres of tribal trust land.

The Community invites proposals and a formal statement of qualifications from valuation services and/or interested land appraisal firms with appropriate expertise wishing to be considered and evaluated for the submission of an opinion of value. The valuation and fair market value should be based on the premise that federal trust land, as specified in federal law, is not subject to condemnation and therefore, not directly comparable to conventional fee land market transaction. Fair market value refers to a body of precedent lease or ROW transactions associated with Indian lands but also the location, value of the project and other intangible matters unique to a tribe's permanent homeland and limited land availability. The fair market value of the subject ROW is defined as the sum of the base annual value per acre as escalated annually by an appropriate inflation factor and land appreciation factor in each year multiplied by the total number of acres that are encumbered by the ROW. Any submitted RFP should consider the market value for acquisition of the ROW and market rent for the easement corridor maintaining the 16-inch water main for the requested duration of 25 years with an option for an additional 25 years extension as well as the value associated with the encumbrance it creates for the Community and related resources

The response should include a statement regarding the proposer's approach, which includes but is not limited to: methodologies on determining economic valuation and market rent for obtaining an easement of ROW on Indian lands. The proposer shall provide details of the firm's experience and identify the proposed project staff and their experience with similar past services.

Planting seeds with little ones

A spring or summer garden activity with toddlers can be as simple as planting a few bean seeds. Little ones will love watching the tiny seeds grow into a tall green plant and it's a fun way to add some handson science to your activities. Gardening with kids can be a beneficial activity in many ways. It supports fine motor and cognitive skills. It also provides sensory play with the many different materials involved in a planting activity. Gardening with kids can be this easy – and beneficial! Kids engage in fine

motor skills to fill the cup with soil and plant the seeds. Early learning continues as kids observe changes in the plant as it grows, and produces something good to eat!

Supplies needed to plan seeds: *Bean seeds, Soil, tray,







Others include; Tom Cole, a Chickasaw of Oklahoma, Yvette Herrell, a Cherokee of New Mexico, Sharice Davids of Kansas, a Ho-Chunk and Deb Haaland of New Mexico, a Laguna Pueblo.

Haaland recently resigned her seat last month to become Secretary of the Interior, returning the number of Native Americans in Congress to four.

Chairman accompanied the Congressmen on a tour of the Industrial Park, Ak-Chin Regional Airport, Hickman's

Ranch. Egg Ak-Chin Farm, Southern Dunes and into the Community, where we made a stop and payed their respects to the Ak-Chin Community by visiting the San Juan Church.
