West Point Leadership Workshop held at **Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino** Story and photo R. Peters

On February 18, Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino hosted the United States Military Academy West Point for a one-day workshop focused on Leadership Ethics and Diversity in STEM for Native American Youth.

The workshop, which was sponsored by West Point, in partnership with Hesperus, provided the opportunity for high school students to learn ethical and technological skills needed to become effective leaders.

"Because this is the 1st Ethics-Leadership/ STEM Event West Point is hosting explicitly for our Native American Youth, it's receiving an increase in visibility by State, Federal and Senior Corporate Partners who view Native American Community Engagement as a high priority." Christopher Key, Board Member, Hesperus.

"This event will be used as the frame-work and model for other events in regional areas with high concentrations of Native American Key communities." added, "Arizona was the first choice to initiate this effort given the number of Native Communities, and thought to be well received because its messaging is solely focused on the next generation of leadership; our Native American Youth."

Students were sought out from the sister tribes: Ak-Chin Indian Community, Gila River Indian Community, Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation, Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community and San Carlos Apache Tribe. Ak-Chin attendees included Kaylan Peters and Celeste Gloria.

Students were separated into different groups for hands-on small and large group sessions led by a West Point Cadet and facilitated by West Point staff and

Ak-Chin Chairman Robert Miguel, surrounded by West Point Cadets after speaking on February 18. professionals. STEM The Cadets also served as role models for those students who may be interested in attending the United States Military Academy in the future.

Sessions were held in the morning and afternoon, set up in the Harrah's Event Center. After lunch, presentations continued to provide group engagement.

The workshop sessions focused on Leadership Ethics, **STEM** & Workshop, Educator Workshop and Fitness Challenge.

"This program or event is considered a postsecondary outreach, studies show exposure is key for high school students in their discovery of postsecondary education and career exploration. we (myself, Initially, Kaylan Peters and Celeste Gloria) did not know what to expect from this prestigious military academy." "The students were engaged and Kaylan and Celeste presented a positive message on ethical challenges, leading by example, and staying active in high school through sports and student groups. The highlight of the day was observing both participants receive certificates, Kaylan won for being an exceptional leader and Celeste won an award for a short essay she wrote on leadership. At the end of the day, both were happy they attended, 'a worthwhile

Chin Higher Education and beneficial activity'."

The mission of the Center for Leadership and Diversity in STEM is to increase the recruitment and retention of African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans, and other underpopulations resourced in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). This mission is aligned with the national need to increase the number of STEM experts, for a shortage of talent threatens the country's ability to drive innovation, compete internationally, and

Chairman Miguel had a very busy itinerary planned during his fourday trip. "Much of it was meetings with the Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee and NFL Executives. We also attended events and dinners to get better acquainted with one another and I basically gave a history of who the Ak-Chin Indian Community are and tried the best to give information on the other 21 Tribes of Arizona."

While attending the many events Chairman Miguel met with many people, including the organizers of this year's Super Bowl, "to get an idea of what goes into putting the Super Bowl together. Ideally, it really does take up a whole year to organize the event, which is considered the top sporting event in the entire world."

He also had the opportunity to meet star athlete Franco Harris, who played as a running back for the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1972-83. "I was able to meet and have a lengthy

conversation with Pittsburgh Steelers Great and NFL Hall of Famer, Franco Harris. Franco really was interested in Native American Tribes in Arizona and their way of life. We exchanged contact information and planned to stay in touch as the Super Bowl in Glendale neared, he had interest in coming out to Ak-Chin to golf and visit the community."

Chairman Miguel attended the NFL Honors, where awards were given to players for their play during the 2021 year; from MVP, Defensive Player of the Year, Rookie of the Year, Coach of the Year other prestigious and awards. He also attended Super the Arizona Bowl Host Committee

Yes... you've seen this before I have asked those pesky Care workers to do their Intake Reassessments. With social distancing in mind we can take information over the phone or when you pick up your meal. Please allow them to visit with you and get these done. Please bear with us!

We'll try to make it as painless as possible!



What is an Intake? Our services are paid for with federal grants and with those grants come rules and requirements that we must follow. One of these requirements is Intakes.

A client intake form is a questionnaire our department uses to document the information to show that you are qualified to receive services from our department.

It asks an elder to provide information that can help our department both determine whether that Elder is qualified for services, and shape a strategy to address that Elders needs, interests, and services.

We are required to keep a record of every elder who receives our services. Whether it is for 46 meals a month, 23 meals a month, or 1 meal a year. All services must be counted, recorded, and reported to the various

funding sources.

The first Intake we do is when you first become an Elder. (Age 55) From this we have proof of eligibility. Each year thereafter we are required to do an Intake reassessment. It takes anywhere from 5 to 15 minutes depending on if there are any changes.

We also do a reassessment if you have not used our services in the past but it is determined you need or want them.

For example, if you turn 55 and don't need or want our services but something changes. Maybe you become sick or have an injury or illness that makes it difficult to cook for yourself. Maybe you don't have transportation and need a ride to the clinic. These services must be documented and you must have an up to date Intake on file to receive them. lf you receive a food box or gift card for food,

those services must be documented and you Must have a current Intake on file.


If you pickup or receive meals from our department you must have an intake and allow intake reassessments each year or when it is determined you want or need our services. If you need or want transportation from our department we must have a up to date assessment. If you receive food boxes or gift cards from our department you must have an Intake on file.

At this time, we can take intake information over the phone or when you pick up a meal. We will be stopping by to visit with Homebound Elders and Caregivers.

On Tuesday, February 1, Ak-Chin Sanitation/Public Works received a refresher course on asphalt training.

The purpose of the refresher course was to introduce new staff members to the machines that the department utilizes to repair and fill in cracks in the asphalt. The training was conducted around the Ak-Chin Recreation and Library parking lots.

The crew met with reps Daniel Darling and Jason Raya from Crafco, a company from Chandler that has been coming out to provide the training.

"We've been trying to get started since the pandemic started," Sanitation Director, Delbert White shared. They have had to reschedule the training numerous times due to the pandemic, scheduling conflicts and shortage of

staff. "We just got vacancies filled and allows us to move forward with previous plans."

Delbert said the staff was excited to get the training going and they will soon be working with community departments to schedule their parking lots for asphalt repairs. "We will be crack filling, recoating the parking lot asphalt, repainting parking lines, emergency curbs, handicap parking symbols and so on and to make it clear we are NOT repaying roads. its more maintenance projects, such as pot holes, crack filling and recoating."

Delbert also mentioned, "We are excited to get started with new staff and we will definitely be training on some more equipment we have in the fleet that is used as a part of the maintenance projects."



Employee shares experience on 60 Days In

We would like to thank Mr. Johnny Joe Ramirez, who works as a Central Plant Operator for the Ak-Chin Indian Community, for volunteering to share his experience on A&E's 60 Days In.

60 Days In is a television docuseries on A&E, that follows volunteers who go undercover and spend 60 days in as an inmate. Johnny was featured in the Season 4, as a gang member. Season 4 aired 14 episodes from January to March, 2018.

How did you come to be on the A&E show? I had seen season 1&2 before and one day I commented on A&Es Facebook website and they reached out to me and heard about my life story and asked if I would go in.

What was show about? A&E introduces 7 individuals from all walks of life and puts them undercover as real inmates into a jail facility to gather information to why drugs and corruption is happening in the jail from the correction

even if A&E wanted me to change my name.

Who/what was biggest influence to you during your 60 days (inmate/ counselor/officer)? There was a young man by the name of "Blue Black". He was so encouraging even what he was going through in life.

What biggest was highlight being on show? The highlight has to be that I was able to see my future if I hadn't changed my ways as a young man and took life seriously and grew up. Instead of being the problem to society, I am now the solution to my community.

What was biggest takeaway from being on the show? This showed me what my son is going through that is locked up for 12 years. Made me understand his walk. in jail.

In what ways have you been able to give back to your community? I found by giving back to my community is what I remember what I was
