Allen Allcott retires at 27 years of service

On St. Patrick's Day, longtime employee Ak-Chin Fire Marshal, Allen Allcott hung up his boots for Ak-Chin Fire.

A small surprise ceremony was held at Ak-Chin Recreation gym to honor Allen, with the intersession students congratulating and presenting him with a paneled ax plaque.

Allen has worked for Ak-Chin Fire since 1994, "I started volunteering with Ak-Chin Fire mid 1994 while taking my EMT class with Bill White."

He recalled some of the crew he worked with during his tenure. "I started with Bill. Connie, Adella, Cecil, Flora, Gloria, Isabel, Frank and Tweetie. Myself, Candace, and Bob got hired full time in 1995."

Before working with Ak-Chin, Allen worked as a Bashas'.

His list of achievements and certificates included; EMT, Intermediate EMT, and Paramedic, Firefighter I and II, Captain and Fire Marshal.

Allen also became a part time Flight Medic with Air Evac for two years and was an instructor on many different levels for EMS and Fire classes. His duties ranged from Emergency Medical Services to firefighting, swift water and high angle rescue, public education, and fire inspections.

On May 13, 2005, Allen

risked his life to save an unconscious man during a car accident-fire while off-duty.

He received the Symbol of Excellence Award as the 2005 United Fire Firefighter of the Year

for his heroic act.

Allen shared a few other memories during his career with Ak-Chin.

"Happy moments were whenever I felt I made a difference, one in partic-

ular, I was on a call that came in as possible low blood sugar and turned out to be a major heart attack and I defibrillated the patient 8 times and brought him back and he got over 10 more years with his family."

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My first fire was on Farrell just across the wash. It was a kitchen fire and Bob Blagen and I were on that one. Another would be the fire in the restaurant Ace in the Hole and Runner building. That one put me and Frank in the hospital.

We had a high angle rescue out on highway 84 for a climber who had fallen. It was too windy (for) helicopter and too tight of an area to remove him. We worked with a Phoenix rescue group to get him off the mountain."

Candace, Allen's wife shared in an email a pic of one of the babies Allen delivered.

"We got a call for a lady in labor at the Texaco in Maricopa, it is now Shell I think. Cindy and I got there and she was in full blown labor to the point we delivered the baby about 10 minutes later in the back of the ambulance. When the baby was about a month old they came in to say thank you. There's a young girl here in Ak-Chin I helped deliver."

"It has been an awesome experience; the community has provided me the opportunity to provide for my family and given me the ability to help a lot of people.

One cannot put to words the gratitude I have for

the community and all the members I have had the chance to meet.

As Chairman said I feel like part of the family and feel that many people in the community are part of Candace and my family. You grow and become very close to everyone through that many years. I will say thank you to everyone who has helped me and supported me over the years, especially my wife.

Over the years Cecil has turned into a great friend and an amazing boss. He taught me so much I cannot say thank you enough to him as well as all of the Community Councils I have worked under and the Community Members I have served."

Candace also joked "he thinks he's retiring" but Allen will most likely stay busy doing what he loves as the Chief for Thunderbird Fire District, even though he said he plans to "Relax, play golf and try a few new challenges."

Community.

The Central Plant consists of (3) 900ton Trane Centrifugal Chillers (2700 tons), (3) 900-ton cross flow Marley Cooling Towers as well as (2) 1200-ton Trane Centrifugal Chillers and (2) 1200ton cross flow Marely Cooling towers for a total of 5100 tons of cooling capacity.

The Central Plant's primary chilled water loop is designed to maintain a constant water flow through the chillers evaporator using (3) constant speed pumps rated at 1800 g/min and 2 variable frequency driven pumps rated at 2400 g/min.

The secondary pumping system consists of 5 variable speed chilled water pumps which are controlled by using a differential pressure control (DP) sensor for control to the enterprises depending on the maximum chilled water valve and its current temperature differential setpoints.

from home they took advantage of that time to do early childhood educational training through First Things First, Child Care Educational Institute and other trainings that were available virtually. Our staff of 16 in the time we were closed did over 357 courses collectively.

Did the school have to make significant changes to be able to reopen to full time?

Initially in June 2021, when we were permitted to have the children in person for 2 days a week, who were going into kindergarten. We just had to look over our protocols that were created the year before so we could put them into practice. We had already ordered material and equipment needed and the IMT and their members helped us out tremendously with additional PPE for staff and the children.

During the time of the closure, how did you and your staff face the challenge of keeping the kids up to date with essentials? learning Like what did the school do to help the kids stay onboard with preparing for kindergarten?

The teachers work very hard to create intentional educational activities that would be beneficial for the children and easy for parents to help facilitate at home. Those were delivered weekly.

We even did a virtual kindergarten round up with the Education

Advisors. 2019-2020 school year was coming to an end and we were still not open, we started creating protocols based on what the best practice was for a Pandemic and model those practices in our health and wellness procedures. We hoped that once reviewed maybe we would be able to open in person but it was not approved. We had to end the school year with an extended year of virtual learning and close with a Graduation Parade for the children going into kindergarten.

Then in January 2021, we started training for doing zoom classes with all the children who were enrolled with us. The teaching staff did a wonderful job getting the children engaged learning virtual along with the weekly activity bags that were supplementing the zoom

How excited were you and the staff to be back at work full time? What were the things that you missed about being at the school?

I was definitely very excited to have all my staff back 100%. Then to prepare for the children to be back full time was such wonderful news. All our staff have been waiting patiently to hear that news the whole time we were closed or on working with 50% of the preschool in person with limited hours.

The one thing that was missed the most was the children's laughter,

voices, energy that they brought to our facility. Without having them here it was really sad seeing these beautifully decorated classrooms with no children in them. Now it is a wonderful atmosphere to walk in and hear the happy sound of children learning and interacting with the staff.

Is there anything you would like to share about being back after so long of uncertainty?

First and foremost a huge thank you to the Community Council for keeping our program funded and our wonderful staff employed. A big thanks to the IMT team for helping us navigate through that time. A big thank you and round of applause to the entire ECE staff for being flexible in their work and sticking it out the whole time. They truly are a group of wonderful



NOTICE of PUBLIC SCOPING

Environmental Assessment for the SR 238 Waterline Extension, SR 238, Ak-Chin Indian Community

IN REPLY REFER TO: Superintendent

The U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Pima Agency (Agency) is releasing this notice of an environmental assessment (EA) for the proposed SR 238 Waterline Extension (Project) along the north side of SR 238 on Ak-Chin Indian Community (Community) lands. The project would consist of construction, operation, and maintenance of a new waterline to serve the Apex Motor Club Raceway located west of Community land. This notice is intended to provide details about the proposed project, and to request your input.

Proposed Action

The project proponent, Global Water - Santa Cruz Water Company, Inc. (Global Water), has submitted a right-of-way (ROW) application to the BIA for the development of a new waterline within an easement held by the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) for SR 238 across Community lands.

The project is expected to avoid existing utilities and no utility relocations are anticipated to be necessary. The project would consist of trenching to make way for the approximately 16-inchwide waterline to be located at a minimum depth of 4 feet. Trenching would be completed via excavator. However, waterline installation within the vicinity of washes may be completed via borings to install the waterline under the washes which may require work occurring on Community lands outside of the existing ADOT easement on the north side of SR 238. Construction access would be granted via SR 238. Portions of pavement along SR 238 may require saw cutting, removal, and replacement as part of the waterline installation. Upon completion of the waterline installation, trenches would be backfilled and soils compacted. A contractor use area for parking, staging and stockpiling would be located at the APEX facility to the west. No lane

closures along SR 238 are expected, but minor

lane shifts may be necessary and temporary traffic control signage would be used to alert motorists.

A new approximately 20-foot-wide by one-milelong ROW would be necessary for the waterline on the north side of SR 238 across Community land; additional temporary construction easements may be needed from Ak-Chin lands for construction access and waterline installation.

Purpose and Need

Development of the proposed Project on Community land requires issuance of a new ROW by the BIA, which is considered a federal action subject to the National Environmental Policy Act

(NEPA). The purpose of the project is to construct, operate, and maintain a waterline extension to the Apex Motor Club Raceway to supply water needed for operation of the facility. The project would also increase revenues paid to the Community. BIA's purpose is to respond to Global

Water's application for a ROW under 25CFR169.

Scoping Period

As part of NEPA, federal agencies are required to consider the potential social and environmental impacts of proposed actions. This letter serves as the BIA's invitation to you or your agency to submit comments, concerns, or suggestions regarding the proposed action. All comments received become part of the public record associated with this proposed action. Accordingly, your comments (including your name and address) will be available for review by any person that wishes to

view the record. At your request we will withhold your contact information to the extent allowed by the Freedom of Information Act. 
