## **Ak-Chin Elder Center** reopens for services

Starting on April 4th, the Ak-Chin Elder Center reopened their doors to the Community's seniors, once again providing breakfast and lunch meals in the Elder Center dining room.

reopening brought many smiles, as elders were allowed to gather for the first time since the closing of the Elder Center back in March of 2020, for health concerns amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

The empty center and staff were very lonely and quiet without their beloved patrons.

the Congregate Meal Program was also halted until further notice, although breakfast and lunch were being provided at the Elder curbside Center via pickup, and delivery for those who qualified.

Elders visiting center on the morning of April 5th, were happily congregating once again, enjoying their breakfast with one another.

Sharing smiles and being with friends, family and staff members was something that the elders in the community had been longing for.

Now, they are able to get the much-needed interaction that they once had before Covid hit, two years ago.

That is a very long time for anyone to adjust to; no social interaction; especially for the older generations who are used to their daily routines helpful elder

With the Community reopening departments to 100 percent workforce as of March 21st, the

Elder Center and other Community departments are slowly reinstating many of their daily programs.

This reopening now allows elders to come back to the Elder Center for their congregate meals and other gatherings and activities.

Now that the Elder Center is fully open, there is no longer curbside pick-up for breakfast and lunch.

Vice Chairman, Lemuel Vincent opened the meeting scheduled for 6pm. Once he greeted everyone who signed on, an opening prayer was offered by Council member Lisa Garcia.

Vice Chairman first commented the question asked in previous meetings

about the next in-person Community Meeting, as he shared, "we're actually working on getting the next one in person."

Vice-Chair announced the membership Council's decision to return to full capacity, meaning all Community departments are now back to 100% workforce.

He also announced the approval Community's the sponsorship with NABI, "which I think myself is

COVID19 and Ak-Chin Community restrictions during COVID 19, that the Elder Center delivered breakfast." Leslie added.

Home delivered lunch is ONLY provided to eligible homebound elders, through Elder Center and Title VI Program Grant Funding and Reporting, funded through Older Americans Act Title VI. The Title VI program is designed for elders to come in to socialize with one another over a hot meal.

In order to receive a home delivered meal, elders must meet a certain criterion. "We must report to the Federal Government Title VI Older Americans regarding elders we serve. We must report every meal that is served. In-Take forms and reassessments are done as part of that reporting. We determine eligibility through an In-Take Form completed by the Elder

Center staff." Leslie shared.

Leslie also shared that the In-Take Form can be done over the phone, however, it is best if a member of the Elder Center staff can meet with the elder in person. In-Take forms are done on new elders that just turned 55. In-Take forms on all elders are updated annually.

Below is a list of Home Bound Delivery eligibility guidelines.

- You do not have a car and/ or you are unable to drive on your own.
- Your doctor believes that your health or illness could get worse if you leave your home.
- You are fragile and/or bedridden.
- need assistance with daily living such as bathing, using the toilet, cooking, dressing, etc.
- You are unable to leave home without your assistance.
- Because of illness or

injury, you need the aid of supportive devices such as crutches, canes, wheelchairs, and walkers; the use of special needs transportation; and the assistance of another person in order to leave your home.

Not every situation can be listed. That is why a reassessment is necessary to evaluate each and everyone's needs and circumstances.

It is understandable that some elders may be cautious about returning to the Elder Center for a meal. The Elder Center following COVID-19 protocols for everyone's safety, and hopes to see more elders in the coming weeks.



within the organization and the impact it may have to the rural communities such as Ak-Chin."

Garcia shared the upcoming Community distribution and Covid testing dates. She then focused on meetings with the community's economic development review committee, as well as the feasibility studies going on in the community.

She mentioned the quarterly updates with Harrah's, work sessions with the Treasurer, Housing, Purchase Referred Care program, and upcoming projects.

After Council completed their reports the Member Q & A Session began with questions being sent in. Questions included; process for hiring positions. care plans, next community meeting location, status of temp workers program, status on updating code of ethics for Council members, summer youth work program, NeoGov hiring process and the hiring freeze.

After the Q and A concluded, Council Secretary Vicki Smith announced raffle winners.

Council shared similar sentiments about how "look they forward seeing everyone at the next community meeting."

March Community Meeting adjourned at 7:07 pm.

## **Adult Protective Services**

Services are provided to the elderly and vulnerable adults who may be at risk of being a victim of abuse, neglect, or exploitation.

What is adult abuse?

When a community Elder or vulnerable adult have been subjected to physical, emotional or sexual abuse, neglect or self-neglect, or financial exploitation.

What are some of the signs of possible abuse?

· Unexplained injuries or behavior. · Appears afraid of a person or situation.

· Isolation

· Sudden decline in physical appearance.

· Untreated injuries or health problems. · Unsafe living conditions.

· Missing money or unaccounted for finances.

· Disappearance of possessions or property.

What do we do? Adult Protective Services (APS) receives and evaluates reports of suspected adult abuse, neglect and exploitation. Investigation and validation of adult abuse

reports are the responsibilities of Adult Protective Services. If you feel you are being abused or suspect an Elder or

#### **Tribal Transportation Improvement Program (TTIP):**

from a Tribe's priority list, public comments, and Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). • TTIP is "financially constrained" based on funding source(s).

• TTIP is a 5-year listing of transportation projects obtained

- TTIP projects are needed for Fiscal Years: FY 2022, FY 2023, FY
- 2024, FY 2025, FY 2026.
- TTIP is updated once every 4 years, or it may be updated annually.
- Projects identified and approved for the TTIP will be provided to the BIA with a supporting Resolution.

### **What is Child Protective Services**

Child Protective Services operates under Health and Human Services Department to Respond to Reports of suspected Child Abuse or Neglect.

## We are Required to by law to:

Act in response to all reports/referrals of suspected child maltreatment.

Evaluate child safety.

Support and Strengthen families, whenever possible. Facilitate services to families to help ensure the Safety of their

Help to Prevent future abuse or neglect.

#### When to Report A report should be made when any person, who reasonably

believes that a child under the age of 18 has been abused, neglected, exploited, or abandoned. A report of suspected abuse, neglect, exploitation or

abandonment is only a request for an investigation. The person making the report does not need to prove the abuse.

Investigation and validation of child abuse reports are the responsibilities of Child Protective Services.



The U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Pima Agency (Agency) is releasing this notice of an environmental assessment (EA) for the proposed SR 238 Waterline Extension (Project) along the north side of SR 238 on Ak-Chin Indian Community (Community) lands. The project would consist of construction, operation, and maintenance of a new waterline to serve the Apex Motor Club Raceway located west of Community land. This notice is intended to provide details about the proposed project, and to request your input.

### **Proposed Action**

The project proponent, Global Water – Santa Cruz Water Company, Inc. (Global Water), has submitted a right-of-way (ROW) application to the BIA for the development of a new waterline within an easement held by the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) for SR 238 across Community lands.

The project is expected to avoid existing utilities and no utility relocations are anticipated to be necessary. The project would consist of trenching to make way for the approximately 16-inchwide waterline to be located at a minimum depth of 4 feet. Trenching would be completed via excavator. However, waterline installation within the vicinity of washes may be completed via borings to install the waterline under the washes which may require work occurring on Community lands outside of the existing ADOT easement on the north side of SR 238. Construction access would be granted via SR 238. Portions of pavement along SR 238 may require saw cutting, removal, and replacement as part of the waterline installation. Upon completion of the waterline installation, trenches would be backfilled and soils compacted. A contractor use area for parking, staging and stockpiling would be located at the APEX facility to the west. No lane closures along SR 238 are expected, but minor

lane shifts may be necessary and temporary traffic control signage would be used to alert motorists.

A new approximately 20-foot-wide by one-milelong ROW would be necessary for the waterline on the north side of SR 238 across Community land; additional temporary construction easements may be needed from Ak-Chin lands for construction access and waterline installation.

### **Purpose and Need**

Development of the proposed Project on Community land requires issuance of a new ROW by the BIA, which is considered a federal action subject to the National Environmental Policy Act

(NEPA). The purpose of the project is to construct, operate, and maintain a waterline extension to the Apex Motor Club Raceway to supply water needed for operation of the facility. The project would also increase revenues paid to the Community. BIA's purpose is to respond to Global

Water's application for a ROW under 25CFR169.

### **Scoping Period**

As part of NEPA, federal agencies are required to consider the potential social and environmental impacts of proposed actions. This letter serves as the BIA's invitation to you or your agency to submit comments, concerns, or suggestions regarding the proposed action. All comments received become part of the public record associated with this proposed action. Accordingly, your comments (including your name and address) will be available for review by any person that wishes to

view the record. At your request we will withhold your contact information to the extent allowed by the Freedom of Information Act. 


