On May 20, Congressman Tom O'Halleran paid а visit to the Ak-Chin Indian Community to present Ak-Chin Indian Community Police Department with a check for \$500,000 in federal funding.

Rep. O'Halleran requested and secured the funds under the FY2022 House Appropriations Committee. The funding awarded to the Ak-Chin Police will be used to purchase equipment to enhance individual officer preparedness and response to the unpredictable and fluid environment of Tribal

law enforcement.

"I was honored to visit the Ak-Chin Indian Community to with talk Chairman Robert Miguel and members of the police force and celebrate the \$500,000 community project funding Ι secured support to

the Ak-Chin Indian Community Police Department's equipment modernization initiative." said O'Halleran.

"I'm looking forward to continued work together to address the needs of tribal law enforcement officers."

"I am honored to have been elected chair of AIGA. In 2021, Tribal Gaming employed more than 20,000 Arizonans," said Miguel.

"This industry has been the most successful economic venture of Tribes in Arizona and nationwide. As chair, I am dedicated to upholding the organization's commitment to advancing the lives of Indian people and helping achieve their goal of self-reliance."

Miguel, a lifelong resident of Maricopa, AZ, began his employment in his community as a farm laborer and has advanced his career in various roles within the Ak-Chin Indian Community, including working as a photojournalist for the Ak-Chin O'odham Runner for more than 20 years before being elected by his people to serve on its Tribal Council.

In addition to serving his Community as Chairman, Miguel currently serves on the Native American Rights Fund (NARF) board of directors, as the first vice president of the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, and as a member of the Maricopa Economic Development Association (MEDA). He recently was the Chair of the Arizonans for

Tribal Government Gaming, an organization that serves as a collective political voice for its Member Tribes.

Chairman Miguel knows what Tribal Gaming has provided for Tribal Communities including education, employment, enhanced services to Tribal Members, and other economic opportunities. development Shared revenue contributions from Tribal Gaming have benefited the Arizona Benefits Fund by \$1.82 billion since 2003. "For this reason, our efforts as an association, must be united to continue to protect Indian Gaming, an industry that is great for Tribes and Arizona," said Chairman Miguel.

"I am pleased Chairman Robert Miguel of the Ak-Chin Indian Community was elected as our new chairman of the Arizona Indian Gaming Association. AIGA needs a strong leader like Chairman Miguel in these turbulent times," said Chairman Terry Rambler of the San Carlos Apache Tribe. "Chairman Miguel brings with him extensive leadership experience and his personality, character traits, team building skills, and vision are what AIGA needs at this time."

Heat Illness Tip Sheet

Tips for staying safe in the heat

When it's hot outside: Preventing heat illness

HYDRATE before, during and after physical activity: Drink 8-10 oz of water every 15-20 minutes.

- Wear loose fitting, light weight clothing, a hat and apply sunscreen before going outside.
- Monitor length of time outdoors, rest frequently and seek shade.

STAY in a cool environment: Avoid exercise or strenuous physical activity outside during periods of extreme weather.

Staying in an air-conditioned
building is the best way to prevent
heat illness

STAY informed about weather-related health & safety updates.

This tip sheet is a component of the Heat and Older Adults Safety Toolkit (HOAST) Please visit us <u>online</u> or email <u>extremeweather@azdhs.gov</u> Watch for common signs and symptoms of heat illness

HEAT CRAMPS: Muscle pains or spasms in arms, legs or abdomen. Heavy sweating.

First Aid: Apply pressure on cramping muscles or gently massage to relieve spasm. Give sips of water. If nausea occurs, discontinue water intake.

HEAT EXHAUSTION: Heavy sweating, weakness, cool, clammy & pale skin, nausea, vomiting, headache, dizziness, possible muscle cramping.

First Aid: Lay down out of sun. Loosen clothing & apply cool, wet cloths. Move to air conditioned room. Give sips of water unless nausea occurs. If vomiting persists, seek medical attention.

HEAT STROKE: High body temperature (above 103 degrees), red, hot, dry skin (no sweating), throbbing headache, unconsciousness, confusion, nausea, rapid, strong pulse.


First Aid: Call 9-1-1 or get to hospital. Move to air conditioned environment. Mist using water, fans or sponging. If body temperatures rise again, repeat process. Do not give fluids. (CDC, 2011) Corn, Cookies
