Thursday, June 16, Federal officials from Washington, DC, representing the Office of Community Services (OCS) at the Administration for Children and Families with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, along with representatives from Inter Tribal Council of Arizona (ITCA) came out to tour Ak-Chin's Water/Waste Water Operations.

Brian Bennon, Director for Inter Tribal Council of Arizona Tribal Water Systems, and a recognized national subject matter expert on tribal water systems, was called upon to assist OCS in meeting with a Tribal leader and tour a Tribal Community that has a wide variety of economic development activities, such as Ak-Chin's farming, industrial park and golf course, among other economic entities that the tribe operates.

The basis for the visit and tour was to see how ITCA's Tribal Water Systems Program, which offers training and technical assistance to Tribal Water and Wastewater Operators as they manage their tribal water utility, has assisted in the tribe successfully running their water systems to support their wide variety of economic entities.

While we have approximately 3 federal agencies that contribute funding to the ITCA TWS national program, one federal agency in particular stays in very close contact with our ITCA TWS director Brian Bennon, and from time to time Travis Lane and I also participate in their special initiatives.

We have a great relationship that brings support and attention to tribal water systems across the United States.

Since the beginning of the Biden administration, ITCA has been receiving an increasing number of requests for meetings and interactions with federal government officials that oversee ITCA's federal grants.

We value having these meaningful relationships with our funding agencies and we see this as helping to educate federal officials about the unique relationship tribes have with the federal government.

You may know that for many years, the Ak-Chin Indian Community worked closely with the ITCA TWS for operational training and technical assistance, which was in part, funded through the Office of Community Services where Mr. Taylor

and his colleagues work. The Ak-Chin Indian Community has achieved a level of success that other tribes could learn from and model as they work along the continuum of training and technical assistance to achieve self-governance in managing their tribal watersystemsoperations which provide the infrastructure for economic growth and transition.

This was a tour of the Ak-Chin Indian Community so that our funding agency representatives can have a firsthand experience of visiting and touring a reservation and learning about the unique environment of tribal communities in a respectful and meaningful way.

Who we are: The Inter Tribal Council of Arizona (ITCA) is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization which serves as a tribal consortium for 21 of the 22 tribes in Arizona. ITCA coordinates its efforts through a wide variety of service areas including Economic Development, Public Health, Research and Environmental Quality programs and services. The highest elected officials for the 21 Tribes in Arizona, serves as a member of the Board of Directors for ITCA.

WOW! Who knew that hitting a humongous ball across the net could be such an exhilarating and hilarious time!!

Kudos to Ak-Chin Parks and Recreation for providing an ultimate team-buildingexperience for community department employees to enjoy, with their one-day Employee Mega Volleyball tournament, held June 14.

Rec staff used traditional volleyball rules, with a few changes, like adding a 5-second rule to get the ball over the net, allowing a 3-man team serving option and a 10-minute game time. “Team-building was our main factor and building up employee morale, when creating rules.”

Nine teams comprised of community employees spent an entertaining evening strategizing how to get a 6ft. diameter beach ball over a regulation sized

volleyball net within 5 seconds, without allowing it to hit the ground, go out of bounds, while trying to keep themselves and the ball from getting stuck in the net.

Teams included: Rec & Destroyers, Mix-Up, Fire Department, Replacement Crew, Da Raptorz, Water Operations, P.D., Preschool and H.R. Minions.

Ak-Chin Parks and Rec, who thought up the game, rules and tournament, said they had first seen the mega ball being used in another department program as a team building exercise, and thus began their research on creating the great team-builder.

“We as a department researched the game through using the internet and watched multiple videos of games being played with same ball; thought

the concepts of the teamwork and strategic components were (a) perfect addition to our employee tournaments we hold throughout the year.”

As teams tried their best to keep the ball in the air, some needed multiple players to push the ball over, while those with a little more oomph and longer arm-span were able to single-handedly heave the ball to their opponent's side of the court.

At first it seemed a bit awkward adjusting to the size of the ball and rules, but once the team's got a bit more comfortable, there were many great plays at the net, and countless funny moments on the court.

The championship game pitted undefeated Fire Department against Water Operations for the winner-take-all game. Fire Department was very efficient as they worked

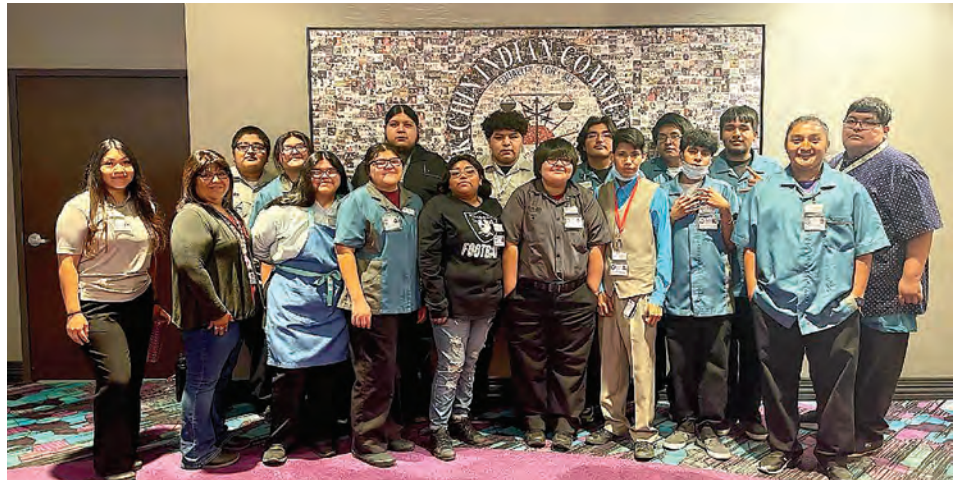

Harrah's 2022 Summer Youth Program

The Harrah's Ak-Chin Summer Youth Program is a branch of the Harrah's Development System (HDS), which is a program department, geared to develop Ak-Chin tribal members with the skills necessary to attain a leadership role within the casino.

Harrah's Ak-Chin's Summer Youth Program provides hands-on work experience, employability skills training, cultural workshops, and leadership development opportunities for the Ak-Chin students, who are between the ages of 16-18.

Fifteen summer youth participants have been working in the casino's non-gaming departments at Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino and Resort, which include our Warehouse, Facilities, Hotel, Housekeeping, and Culinary departments.

In addition to learning on-the-job training, the youth participants will attend an on-property Resume Writing and Interviewing Techniques workshop.

The summer youth participants will have the opportunity to work on their leadership and communication skills, attending weekly Toastmasters club meetings, which are also held on property.

Community member and HDS Manager, Erica Oliver, has coordinated cultural workshops and community service activities which includes participating in a food packing event for a non-profit organization, Feed My Starving Children.

The summer youth participants attend HDS meetings with the HDS Associates and HDS Interns.

The purpose of the Harrah's Ak-Chin Summer Youth Program is to prepare the students for the work world, developing their hard and soft skills.

Several of our current HDS Program interns and graduates are former summer youth participants who decided to apply for the HDS Program, once they turned 18.

Applicants interested in the HDS Program must be at least 18 years of age and possess a high school diploma or GED.

**VOTING AT THE POLLS
KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

Voters may bring in someone to assist them in voting as long as they are not a candidate on the ballot, the voter's employer, or an agent of the voter's labor union.

Voters may also bring in guide animals or assistive devices.

Language assistance is available at many polling places. Navajo language assistance is available on the Navajo Nation, Apache language assistance is available on the San Carlos Apache reservation, Hopi language is available on the Hopi reservation, and Paiute language assistance is available on the Kaibab Paiute reservation.

Alternative formats are available from many counties. These formats include large print, Braille, and audio recordings.

Each polling place is equipped with a touch screen machine capable of large print and an audio representation of the ballot.

Special Election Boards are available in some counties for homebound or disabled voters.

The polls officially close at 7:00 PM and no new voters may get in line after that time. Everyone in line at 7:00 PM will be given the chance to vote.

Children are allowed into the polling place with you but should not be allowed to disrupt other voters.

Active Early Voting List (AEVL) Tips

Voting-by-mail is a safe, secure, reliable, and accessible way to vote!

Voting-by-mail allows registered voters to fill out their ballot from the comfort of their home and then mail it back or drop it off at any drop-box or voting location in their county.

Join the AEVL
Register at <https://bit.ly/AEVL-register> or by submitting a written AEVL request form <https://bit.ly/AEVL-request>

Once you are on the AEVL, you must use your AEVL ballot once every two years to stay on the list!

There is no deadline to join the AEVL. But, to receive a ballot-by-mail for an upcoming election, you must sign up at least 11 days before Election Day.

PROOF OF IDENTIFICATION

THE VOTER SHALL PRESENT ACCEPTABLE IDENTIFICATION WHEN VOTING IN PERSON.

BEARS THE NAME, ADDRESS, AND PHOTOGRAPH OF THE VOTER (SEE LIST 1) OR

TWO DIFFERENT FORMS OF IDENTIFICATION THAT BEAR THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF THE ELECTOR (SEE LIST 2) OR

ONE FORM OF ACCEPTABLE PHOTO IDENTIFICATION WITH ONE FORM OF NON-PHOTO IDENTIFICATION THAT BEARS THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF THE ELECTOR (SEE LIST 3)

ID List 01

- Valid Arizona driver license
- Valid Arizona non-operating identification license
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification
- An identification is "valid" unless it can be determined on its face that it has expired.

ID List 02

- Utility bill of the elector from a dated within 90 days of the date of the election. A utility bill may be for electric, gas, water, solid waste, sewer, telephone, cellular, phone, or cable television
- Bank or credit union statement that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election
- Valid Arizona Vehicle Registration
- Indian census card
- Property tax statement of the elector's residence
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Arizona vehicle insurance card
- Recorder's Certificate
- Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification including a voter registration card issued by the County Recorder
- Any mailing to the elector marked "Official Election Material"
- An identification is "valid" unless it can be determined on its face that it has expired.

ID List 03

- Any valid photo identification from List 1 in which the address does not necessarily match the precinct register accompanied by a non-photo identification from List 2 in which the address does reasonably match the precinct register
- U.S. Passport without address and one valid item from List 2
- U.S. Military identification without address and one valid item from List 2
- An identification is "valid" unless it can be determined on its face that it has expired.

VOTE EARLY

Other tips when voting

- "Push hour" at the polls occurs the first hour that the polls are open, at lunchtime, and after 5 PM. If you are able to vote mid-morning or mid-afternoon there will be less congestion.
- Be sure you are at the correct polling place so that you don't stand in line unnecessarily.
- Use your sample ballot to pre-mark your choices; bring it with you to the polls and simply transfer your selections to the official ballot once you are in the polling place.
- Update your registration whenever you move so that your information will be correct in the Signature Roster.

ID PROVISIONS FOR AMERICAN INDIANS

Tribal IDs are an acceptable form of ID to vote at the polls. Depending on the type of tribal ID, another form of ID may be needed. Check with your Tribe or tribal subdivision to see if other forms of ID, other than your tribal enrollment ID, are acceptable to use when voting at the polls. These could include a voter registration card for tribal elections, or a home site assignment lease.

Tribal ID w/ Photo

Address	Matches voter roll = Standard Ballot
No Address	But does NOT match voter roll = ID from List 2 that matches roster = Standard Ballot

Tribal ID w/ Out Photo

Address	Matches voter roll = ID from List 2 that matches voter roll = Standard Ballot
No Address	No other ID = Provisional Ballot (No need to return with other ID. Ballot will be counted as long as you are voting in your precinct)

Ak-Chin Tribal Transit PUBLIC NOTICE

Starting May 9th, 2022 Transit will be limiting shopping trips to the City of Maricopa. This is a result of the current cost of fuel to provide transportation services. Local in Ak-Chin Community Demand Response services will remain available from 7:00am to 5:45pm Monday through Friday. Transit will offer trips to Maricopa for shopping to twice a day. The reinstatement of full-time services will tentatively take place September 1st, 2022 pending the evaluation of our operations. Doctors' appointments, meetings, employment and non-shopping experiences will not be affected by this change. This only applies to shopping. Due to Professional Development, Transit will be providing limited services only on the following dates during the designated times:

Tuesday July 26th, 2022: 8:30am to 11:30am
Wednesday July 27th, 2022 8:30am to 11:30am
Thursday July 28th, 2022: 8:30am to 11:30am

Demand-response services are available within the Ak-Chin Indian Community and most commercial and government addresses located within a five-mile radius of Community boundaries. Without exception, **ALL RESERVATIONS MUST INCLUDE EITHER A PICK-UP OR DROP-OFF LOCATION WITHIN THE AK-CHIN INDIAN COMMUNITY.**

Our demand-response service is a reservation-based system which operates on a first-come first-served basis. We recommend that you make your reservation at least 2 hours in advance of your requested pick-up time. You may make a reservation up to 7 days in advance. Last minute requests may be accommodated if the schedule permits but may not always be available. The following information will be required when making a reservation: Name, phone number, pick-up address, drop-off address and requested pick-up time. Reservations may be made Monday through Friday, from 7:00am to 5:45pm. **You must be 15 years or older to make reservations for our demand-response service.**

NO SHOWS: If you are not present when the vehicle arrives, the driver will wait three minutes. After three minutes, the driver must proceed with the route and the passenger will be marked as a no-show. After three no-shows, our services will be declined to you for 30 days. On demand services at times can run on a heavy schedule. Please understand that once a passenger arrives at their destination the driver will not wait for a passenger to get back on the vehicle. They will proceed with the route unless special accommodations were already made with dispatch. We can always be scheduled to return and take you to another location at a future time.

CANCELLING A RIDE: If a trip needs to be cancelled, you are urged to cancel it as early as possible. We ask for a 15-minute notice. If a 15-minute notice is not given and a vehicle is in route, you will be considered a no show. Reliable and on time transportation can be difficult to achieve when proper protocols are not followed.

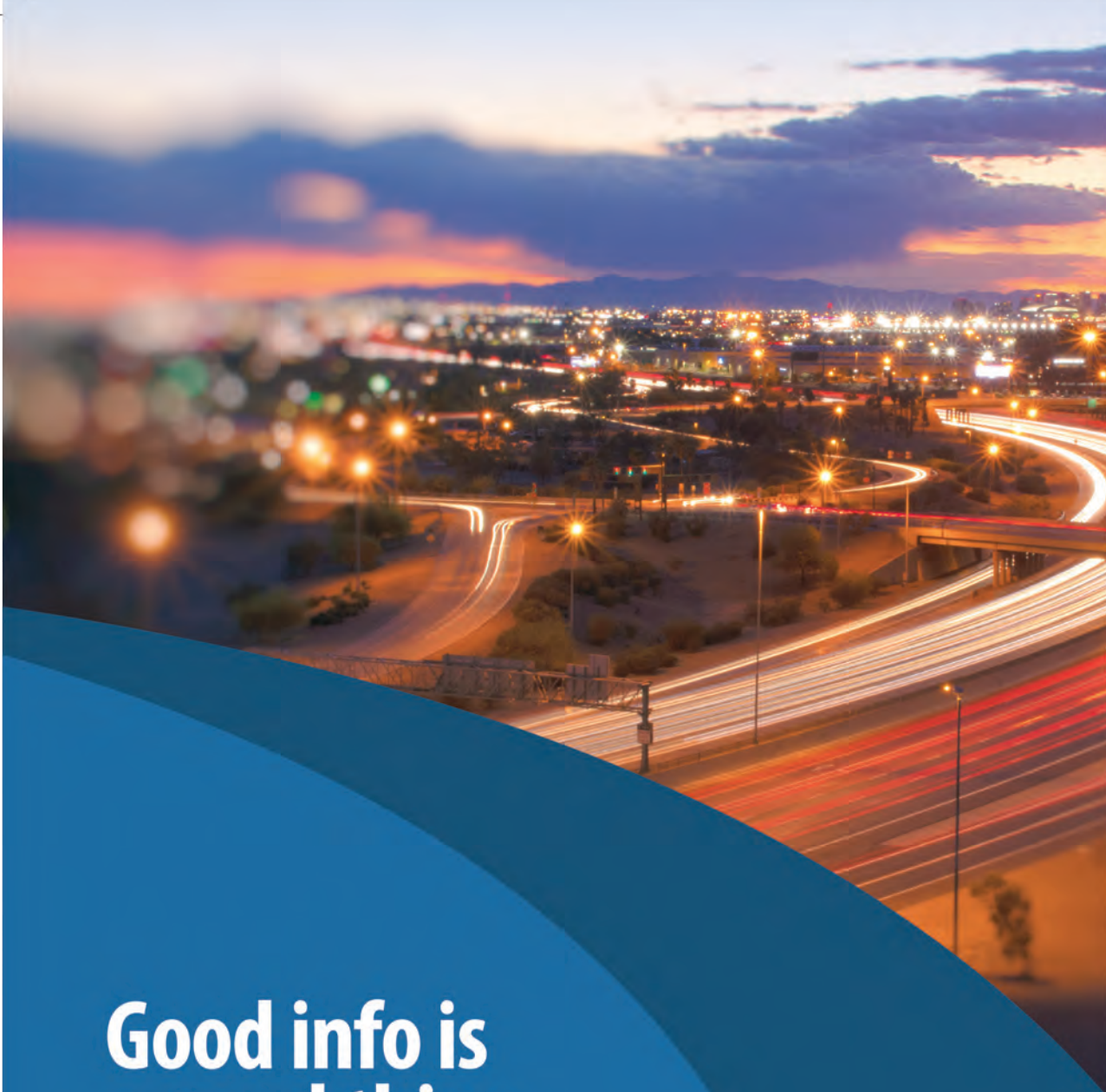
