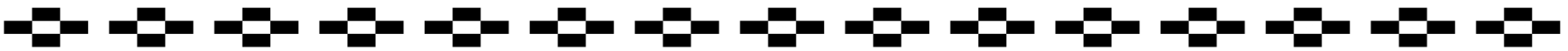

Ak-Chin hosts 2022 Culture Teacher Gathering

September 16, traditional language educators and teachers from surrounding tribes gathered at Harrah’s Ak-Chin Casino Events Center for the 2022 Culture Teacher Gathering, hosted by Ak-Chin Language program.

The Gathering, which was Emceed by Ak-Chin Ranger, Gabriel Lopez, began with a welcome from Ak-Chin Vice-Chairman, Lemuel Vincent, followed by a prayer from Councilmember, Delia Carlyle.

Ak-Chin Language staff honored all teachers with a song and slide presentation that featured former staff and community members; Sylvia Rubalcaba, Genevieve Miguel and Holly Antone, all who’ve passed away. These women were very passionate about their community, language and culture.

young students engaged.

Gohk was very resourceful in creating a classroom group activity for making Chechmaith (tortillas) where he provided materials to create playful and useful props, using felt, paper plates, construction paper, crayons, markers and cardboard.

For Mary (Malia) Garcia, O’odham Education Specialist for the Salt River (Cultural Resources Department) O’odham Piipash Language Program, once her session began, “Psum Hekit O’odhamaj” English ceased to exist as only O’odham was spoken. Assisting in her presentation was Salt River member Diane Cashoya.

In groups of three and four, attendees were invited up to chairs set up in three rows – first row, one chair, second row, three chairs and third row, one chair. Once seated, Malia would select someone and ask them who was seated in front of, beside and behind them. It was a fun exercise, since some did not speak O’odham fluently.

As attendees took turns, it got easier for everyone to respond to the questions and be introduced to fellow attendees. Malia, Diane and O’odham speakers in attendance offered support, and by the end of the session, all had learned a new

set of O’odham words.

Dr. Stanley Rodriguez, Instructor at Kumeyaay Community College in California, presented the Master-Apprentice Language Learning Program, a successful immersion program working for the Kumeyaay people.

Dr. Rodriguez began his presentation of why it is important to speak our languages. “Our language is our birthright,” and “our language defines us as a people,” he said sharing a power point in both the Kumeyaay and English languages.

For the Kumeyaay tribe, fluent speakers are on the decline, and to create more speakers, the teaching process had to meet the tribe’s needs. He explained that in most language learning, like Spanish and French, it is in school structured format and involves reading, writing and speaking the language. The focus of the Kumeyaay program is creating learning environments that involved teaching through activities and immersion.

In this type of setting, they “leave English behind,” and work toward real communication in their language by staying focused and speaking. Modeled in part to the US military’s Foreign Language Center in Monterey,

California, Kumeyaay teaches youth the language in the summer up to six days a week and for almost eight hours. Language classes are offered at the tribal college during the school year.

Dr. Rodriguez shared how teaching your language can be difficult and frustrating, “because in the end what you want to do is develop a group who can communicate through language... Teachers, you speak the language, you are the library of knowledge.”

Candace also shared some of her favorite memories at the Elder center.

"The 1952's Christmas party was one of my favorites. Dancing with Gibson and seeing George and Phyllis dancing together. Watching Connie Narcia sing and enjoy the music so well. I have a great video of that!"

She also shared how she loved seeing "Stella and Elena and all the sisters enjoying Elvis!"

Candace is planning to spend as much time with her grandchildren and continue to work on her gardening project and quilts. She jokingly added that she has to also supervise husband Allen, who recently retired as Ak-Chin Fire Marshal.

"It has been an absolute honor to work here with the Elders. I always thought the Fire Department would be my biggest honor and what I was most proud of, but it didn't come close to being here with the Elders. They will always be important to me. I feel so privileged to have (been) allowed to serve them and learn from them. There are so many special memories."

O'odham Nation presented "Sharing and learning the O'odham language and himdag using resources both past and present."

He showed everyone how to utilize technology to complete a traditional quiz and survey online, by downloading a game-based learning app, Kahoot.

Michael also showed photos of his community and talked about songs, dances and traditional games from long ago, as well as moving forward after Covid and becoming a virtual learner. He also showed photos of students learning about traditional foods, cooking and seasonal harvesting.

He ended with a video on O'odham Elders & the O'odham Language - History and Stories of Tohono O'odham Districts for AZ Humanities, on Vimeo, and another online survey, asking, "Should modern technology be a teaching tool in learning O'odham himdag?"

Once all sessions completed, everyone was invited back to the main ballroom to enjoy lunch and keynote speaker, Caroline Montana-Antone.

Caroline, a member of the Tohono O'odham Nation, has worked tirelessly to revitalize the O'odham Neok since 1954. She began as a clerk typist/material developer for Tohono O'odham San Simon School Title VII language program. She then worked as a Language Consultant/Coordinator for the Salt River Indian Community and Culture Resource Manager for the Ak-Chin Indian Community.

Caroline spoke passionately about creating "our own speakers" as she inspired everyone in the room to move forward on the journey to building an environment for traditional language and culture. She talked about her upbringing and early education, and how her grandfather told her that she had a bigger job, which she learned later was to help bring back the O'odham neok.

Caroline said at first, she didn't realize that not everyone was able to speak their native language fluently. As she shared a lesson from college where she had to learn how to communicate with a foreign language student. "We had no idea what each other said, but we communicated." That experience helped her be more patient and understanding of others to "put myself in that place that I didn't know."

"It was something I grew up with and easy for me... I learned my language because I had that environment, I had my mother, my father, my grandfather, my relatives all talk O'odham and I learned...so we have to create that environment in our communities."

She credits the elders, members and administration at Salt River for creating the language classes, being teachers and supporting the programs.

"It wasn't me, it was the elders who selected the people to work. It takes dedicated staff, administration support - young people if you end up on council, remember that. When you look at doing something for your language, saving your

language, continuing your language, you have to look and create the environment."

She pointed out how the English language is everywhere in the U.S. and in Mexico they all learn their language and "they maintain their language, they have that environment. That's what we need to do. We need to do that to continue our O'odham Neok."

Caroline continued to encourage everyone to do more, serve on language panels, find out about language grants that provide services for the students and being vocal about the needs in your communities.

She also shared her passion on culture resource, "that also is your history, your past, your record of your past, record of all the things that is happening on your land."

Before Caroline finished, she shared one last thing, "I quit working, because I hit a wall."

So, I want to ask you, beg you, take your cancer screenings, men and women... You guys are very important to me because you're carrying on what I cannot do anymore...that's important to me that you do that, (and) you take care of yourself."

Caroline lost a brother and niece to cancer, and she has been in remission five years, as of July.

Ak-Chin Language would like to thank all staff for their hard work, education staff, participants, presenters, and Phu from Harrah's casino.

The Gathering consists of the four sister tribes, Ak-Chin, Gila River, Salt River and Tohono O'odham Nation.

The purpose of the Gathering is to provide language educators new ideas to help teach in their own classroom, and learning O'odham from the different ways each community teaches.

Gila River will be hosting next year 2023.

Absentee Ballots Request

Absentee Voting:

- Any eligible voter who wishes to vote early or who expects to be absent from the Reservation on any election day, or who expects to be physically unable to go to the voting place on such day, may request an absentee ballot by either appearing in person to the Registrar (**Vicky Smith or Mercedes Rivera**) or by sending a letter to the Community Election Committee at 42507 W. Peters and Nall Road, Maricopa, Arizona 85138. A person requesting an absentee ballot shall identify himself or herself using the name under which he or she is enrolled with the Community.
- The applicant for an absentee ballot shall complete and sign the application before a Notary Public. The Notary Public before whom the applicant completes the application shall impress his or her seal on the application. Any person unable to sign the application shall sign his or her mark and have the application signed by a witness. Applications for absentee voter ballots may be mailed or presented in person to the Community Election Committee.
- In-person requests for absentee ballots shall be accepted by the Registrar (**Vicky Smith or Mercedes Rivera**) until five working days preceding Election Day. Mailed requests for absentee ballots shall be postmarked no later than fourteen (14) calendar days prior to Election Day.

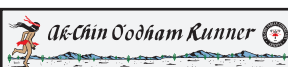
