
Thousands of Native American Veterans throughout the Country gathered in Washington, D.C. on November 11, 2022, Veterans Day, to participate in the National Native American Veterans Memorial Dedication Ceremony.

Ak-Chin Veterans Group was represented by nine Ak-Chin Veterans, who participated in the dedication ceremony, that began with a procession around the grounds of the National Museum of American Indian and National Mall. Arizona southern sister tribes, Salt River, Gila River and Tohono O'odham Nation also had Native veterans represented.

After the procession, there was time allotted for speakers before the ceremonial lighting of the memorial took place. The threeday ceremony had many events and activities offered for Native veterans and their families to enjoy.

The memorial is designated in a special place, in front of the NMAI, along the National Mall and honors all Native American, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian veterans and their families. It will serve to recognize the outstanding numbers of Native Americans who have served in the U.S. Military since the country was founded.

"Currently, more than 31,000 Native Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Alaska Natives serve on active duty, and more

The Native American Heritage Event, held in the Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino Ballroom on in many friends and visitors from local and neighboring communities.

The event was an opportunity for members of the Ak-Chin, Tohono O'odham, Gila River and Salt River-Pima Maricopa tribes to share traditional song and dance performances with the public. Vendors selling traditional arts and crafts were also invited to participate.

Erica Oliver, Harrah's Development System Manager, welcomed guests and acknowledged Harrah's Ak-Chin general manager and leadership team, the Ak-Chin Indian Community Council and Harrah's Ak-Chin banquets team for their pivotal roles in helping to make this

annual event happen.

This year's event was in honor of the late Louis "Tony" Lopez. Tony was very involved with hosting workshops for employees and sharing his community's culture. "He was all about teaching and carrying on the traditions," Oliver stated. "It is a big loss."

The initial purpose of the Native American Heritage Event, beginning in November 2019 to coincide with Native American Heritage Month, was to bring awareness to the cultural diverseness of Arizona's southern tribes.

Starting in 2019, the four southern Arizona tribes which were originally invited were Ak-Chin Indian Community, Gila River Indian Community, Salt River Pima-Maricopa, and

# **Cooking Fires**

Fires resulting from cooking continue to be the most common type of fire experienced by U.S. households. Cooking fires are also the leading cause of civilian fire injuries in homes. These fires are preventable by simply being more attentive to the use of cooking materials and equipment.

With the holidays fast approaching, the Ak-Chin Fire Department would like to give you some safe cooking tips.

The kitchen can be one of the most hazardous rooms in the home if you don't practice safe cooking behaviors. Here are some safety tips to help:

- Never leave boiling, frying, or broiling food unattended. Stay in the kitchen! If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- Check food that is cooking regularly and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire – oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels, or curtains – away from your stovetop.
- Keep the stovetop, burners, and oven clean.
- Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves when

cooking. Loose clothing can dangle onto stove burners and can catch fire if it comes in contact with a gas flame or electric burner.

Have a "kid-free zone" of at

- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions when installing, cleaning, and operating cooking equipment.
   Plug microwave ovens or other
- Plug microwave ovens or other cooking appliances directly into an outlet. Never use an extension cord for cooking appliances as it can overload the circuit and cause a fire.
- Check electrical cords for cracks, breaks, or damage.

### If You Have a Cooking Fire

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- After you get out call 9-1-1, if the call is not going through call 520-568-1200 for the Ak-Chin Police Department.
  If you do try to fight the fire, be
- If you do try to light the life, be sure others are already getting out and you have a clear path to the exit.
  Always keep a lid nearby
- when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan. Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. To keep

the fire from restarting, leave the lid on until the pan is completely cool.

• In case of an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

### **Barbecue Grills**

Stovetop and oven fires are not the only types of cooking fires. While many of the safety tips are similar to indoor cooking, there are special concerns with barbecue grills.

- Position the grill well out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area by declaring a 3-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.
  Put out several long-handled
- Put out several long-handled grilling tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames when cooking food.
  Periodically remove grease
- and fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.Use only outdoors! If used
- Use only outdoors! If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces such as tents, barbecue grills pose both fire and carbon monoxide hazards.

Mary Sam and Shania Manuel from the S-tuha Bidag Community in the Hikiwan District opened with traditional songs and memories of Tony. The first song was about bringing in good thoughts and feelings into the room. Their harmonious voices filled the spacious ballroom. Other beautiful songs were shared including a very special one that was dedicated to Tony.

Following was master of ceremonies, Fred Lopez, radio personality of the KOHN O'odham Hewel Niok Network. He spoke in his native language then with an English translation. He thanked Erica for recognizing his brother and shared the many ways that Tony touched the lives of those he knew. Fred expressed that he was a testament for the community's way of life and had a wonderful passion for teaching students about the Man in the Maze.

annual event's first dance group, the Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc included Keihindam, family of Tony Lopez. The formations were held by the dancers included clouds, rainbows and birds which are visual representations of the elements. The performers in front held the clouds, the birds were held in the middle and the dancers in the back held the rainbows indicating the time after the rain has passed.

between the performances, Fred spoke of the social round dance which invites those from the audience to join. Fred stressed that it is important to keep the circle of hands together, closed remind to everyone of the closeness of the community.

The second group was San Simon School of the Tohono O'odham Nation. The dancers helped to lead the group into the ballroom, wearing beautiful traditional dresses with the colors of yellow and purple and ribbons in red, orange and yellow, as well as shell necklaces. At the end of the dances, each member of the group introduced themselves, many speaking in their language followed by an English translation.

introduced, sentiments of how nice it was to be back performing in person were expressed and shared with the audience. There were four dancers and four singers from districts different within the Gila River Indian Community. The performers held intricate baskets as part of their dances. As with previous performances, the group ended their session with a large social circle inviting event attendees to join.

When the final group, the Wa:k Tab Basket Dancers, entered the ballroom, the dancers faced the audience as with other performances earlier that day. The fabrics included a full spectrum of colors with rich reds, bright yellows and deep purples and blacks. The group also performed with ornate baskets made by tribal

members.

following performers at the event were the Bird Singing and Dancing by the River from the Salt River-Pima Indian Community. It was shared that their style of song and language is very similar to that of the Kumeyaay tribe in southern California and others along the Colorado River. The leader narrated many of the traditional stories of two brothers and shared the meanings behind the songs and dance. The dancers faced the audience which is not a traditional way for the formation as it is customary many times for the dancers to face the singers. This change in positioning emphasized the meaning of the event and the goal of inclusion

This year's event marked the first time in 2 years that the groups could gather in-person. The 2020 and 2021 event held virtually because of the pandemic. Performances streamed on Harrah's Facebook Ak-Chin page. To close the event, Erica Oliver and M.C. Fred Lopez thanked the sister tribes and others in attendance for being part of the annual event and an extra special day that was dedicated to Tony. A reminder of the length of time apart due to covid-19 was also underlined with sentiments of joy and relief to be able to gather together again.
