Opened in 1977, the main library on the campus of the University of Arizona has been a staple for students, faculty, and visitors.

With amenities such as virtual reality, study rooms for both individuals and groups, and building workshops, the library brings in over onemillion visitors making it one of the most visited buildings on campus.

Since its opening nearly 50 years ago, it has always been referred to as the Main Library, that is until May 8, when the University of Arizona main library sign was dedicated to the Ak-Chin Indian Community.

The initiative behind the sign dedication and unveiling was incorporated by the Linguistics Department along with the Native American Advancement & Tribal Engagement (NAATE) Department of the University of Arizona.

The two entities developed the Native Languages of Arizona Campus Sign Initiative to heighten the visibility of Arizona's Native Nations and Native languages on the U of A campus.

Engagement Liaison of NAATE reached out to Ak-Chin regarding this initiative. 2 years in the making.

"It is an honor to have the Community's name dedicated to an area within the University as a symbol for our immediately members that have attended, completed the race. members that are attending and members that are thinking about attending the school," stated Ak-Chin Vice Chairman Lemuel Vincent.

"The library is an area that one can learn the many different aspects pertaining the 22 native tribes within Arizona, as well as the 574 tribes in the United States. Aspects entailing the many diverse cultural identity of each tribe."

The activities which were geared towards getting the elders ready for any future Elder Olympic events included; walking laps around the gym, basketball toss, chicken throw, obstacle course, swatter toss, table hockey, ring toss, pong, min disc-golf, connect 4, Jenga, cornhole toss, stackers, giant uno and checkers.

Pinal 40 Gala recognizes Claude Gipson with 2024 Lifetime Achievement Award

Saturday, May 4, Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino and Resort Ballroom was overflowing with members and guests of Pinal 40, for their 10th Annual Pinal 40 Gala.

The evening was a very special occasion for Pinal 40, as they were honored to celebrate longtime Arizona commodities broker and farmer, Claude Gipson.

Claude Gipson, a wellknown agricultural trader in the valley was recognized that evening, via video, with many of his friends, family and vendors sharing his life's work and honest business ethics for the past 50 years.

Many credited him for his savvy business sense about farming and trading, while others spoke of how he overcame much adversity and discrimination to rise above and fulfill his dreams of becoming a successful businessman

escaping a lynching in Texas. He was looking for a better way of life, and found it in Casa Grande, Arizona.

Although, he did have many difficult moments along the way, he persevered and kept moving forward.

Tim Robinson shared, "Claude Gipson came to Casa Grande, Arizona in 1951, an 18-year-old boy with an eighth-grade education and a 10ft cotton sack and a pair of knee pad and he set to work building his life here, picking over 600lbs of cotton a day by hand for 3 cents a pound."

Claude soon met another young man who was a hard worker like him and they became friends.

"I've worked for Claude Gipson for 55 years this year, and we've been very good friends, like brothers for a long-long time," Ulysses "Slim" Sharp

modities, trading in alfalfa, cottonseed and grains.

"With the help of Louis Maxcy and some others, he built that business into what became probably the most famous commodity trader here in this whole entire valley." Robinson added.

He also owned a restaurant with a few partners, called The Arches and started a towing business, but his friends say he loved the cattle business more than anything.

He was always early to work and pretty much worked seven days a week his whole life, shared his longtime secretary Carolyn Grezecka.

Claude was a generous man, who didn't hesitate where they played cards.

"Claude was proud of that invitation for 2 reasons," Fitzgibbons shared. "#1 it said a lot about where our country had come over his lifetime, but it also told a personal story about how far he had come during his lifetime; from a near lynching in Texas to an invitation to the White House for an inauguration."

"Claude Gipson is the person you can look to and say if you work hard and set your mind to it, you can do just about anything that you want to do in this country." Bill McLean, his personal lawyer shared.

Claude has always helped people, just like Pinal 40. When Pinal 40 first started they wanted to honor

to lend a hand or help somebody in need. He was an honest salesman and well respected by all his peers.

Claude was a big supporter of Barack Obama and was very excited when he was elected president.

Claude, but he didn't accept at that time.

They were glad when Claude finally allowed them to go forward in recognizing him this year.

"I think this is a great honor for him and I'm very proud of him." Carolyn Grezecka, who was Claude's longtime secretary. "I'm proud to have worked for him and I'm proud that other people

are acknowledging him and his hard work within the community."

Newly elected President Tony Salcido was elated to share in congratulating Claude on his award.

"It's a great honor to be able to be up here today to tell you thank you for all you've done and what you've showed many people through the years, that you worked in the industry, especially the seed industry... again thank you very much for letting us honor you today."

Claude was unable to accept his award in person, and so his daughter Rose Gipson was invited to accept on his behalf.

"Unfortunately, due to his health, he as you can see, was not able to attend this gala tonight." Rose shared.

"I just want to say the Gibson family is so elated and appreciate the Pinal 40 for choosing my father, Mr. Claude Gipson for receiving this award... We will always cherish (this event) and will never forget, ever in our lives. Thank you so very much from the bottom of our hearts. We love you, keep us in your prayers."

After Claude's award was received, the evening continued with an auction for many items that were up for bid, including a oneof-a-kind shotgun, pair of diamond earrings, trip to Scotland and a grip of tickets to numerous highend sporting events in Arizona and a great vacation package from Harrah's.

All proceeds would be going to the Pinal 40 scholarship fund.
