Before NABI week began, we hosted our relatives Team Aotearoa Maori, from New Zealand, who made their way to the community once again to share their culture and our court before NABI.


SUNDAY, JULY 21

Chairman Robert Miguel was interviewed by Runner summer workers Auciana Miguel and Teagan Delma on July 8, 2024. They asked him questions regarding his time on council and his thoughts as Chairman.

As we head towards the end of the year, elections are right around the corner. Soon, we will be voting in a new Chairman, as Robert Miguel, our current chairman, will end his long-term service for the community with 11 years of experience on council.

Chairman Miguel has had an extensive work history prior to his chapters as Ak-Chin's Chairman and council member; beginning with Ak-Chin Farms, Parks and Recreation, Community Service and 17 long years with the Runner.

What is it like to serve on the Ak-Chin Tribal Council?

It's special because I'm representing the people of my community. It has allowed me to learn how to continue to serve people and do as much as I can to make their lives better; this takes continued efforts by going to meetings and learning from others.

Speaking attending of meetings, being on tribal council requires plenty of traveling to meet with important people like congressional leaders; from congressmen and senators who are the utmost leaders who can support and advocate for your community's needs. It's what former Ak-Chin leaders have done from our beginnings for the resources we currently have, such as water.

I've been fortunate enough on

congressmen and senators from the State of Arizona and throughout the Country.

What are some of the hard decisions you must face in this position?

The process of making things happen is easier said than done; not everything is dependent on what I say. I am fortunate to have other members of council help answer/decide the decisions that are needed to give the best opportunity for our people and the development of our community. There are plenty of times when every decision that will benefit the community doesn't happen right away. There is a process and it requires patience as we navigate through the best paths to give us an outcome.

There are plenty of continued needs within the community, such as improved services within housing, healthcare, and education just to name a few. You would like to snap your fingers and make these things happen, but it is a work in progress and it takes time, eventually these issues will be tended to, with a potential positive solution. Leaders before me have struggled with this as well, some unfortunately were not ever able to see all the decisions they made to help benefit the community come about until years later. Keep in mind, the decisions made by council members are always to benefit the community, we want to


Angelo Luz graduated from Elevated Academy on Wednesday, June 26th, with a class of 17.

WHATS IN STORE

I was raised by my grandparents, my grandfather Jonas Miguel also had the opportunity to serve as Chairman in the 70's. *He had a strong impact* on my decision to pursue the role of Chairman because I saw how my grandfather was able to advocate for Ak-Chin and try his hardest in making it a better place for all its members.

What have been some of your most memorable moments while serving on council?

My experience meeting three presidents at once, those being former Presidents Barack Obama and Bill Clinton along with current President Joe Biden. Being able to meet all of them at one time and having conversations with them was great! Not many have this opportunity, so I am blessed that I was able to represent my community *in this chance.*

Speaking before Congress has been a highlight. I've been able to testify a number of times on behalf of the community and Indian Country. Every year, Tribal Leaders are invited to Washington D.C. to address their issues, concerns, and get support for their respective communities before Congressional Leaders.

Following their testimony, congress members on the board, ask questions regarding their testimony. This is a priority and opportunity that needs to be taken advantage of when given the chance.

There are 574 federally recognized tribes in the United States, and not all are invited to testify, so this opportunity has to be seized.

Testifying for the first time was emotional, because while speaking, I truly felt the spirit of my people standing behind me, especially those who have passed. This really strengthened me and

gave me the courage to continue to speak as the moment was happening. It can become nerve racking once the television cameras are turned on. I never for one second felt nervous, I just went with the flow.

On the flight back home, I remember feeling a wave of emotions and began crying and had to put my sunglasses on. I realized at that time, that I did something for my people at a national level, and it made me feel good because I was able to do that.

Not all memorable moments were as grandiose as meeting with three presidents and speaking before During a congress. travel to Idaho to speak at an event, I remember having a meal at Pizza Hut.

A family, which consisted of a grandmother and her three grandkids, sat near me and I overheard the children asking their grandmother for

Ak-Chin Education Programs Provide Summer Learning and Fun














emergency dinner.

soda. The grandmother explained to the children that they didn't have enough for the drinks, but this did not seem to upset the children, they were just happy to be with their grandmother.

I took this opportunity to go up to the family and asked the grandmother for a favor. I asked her if I could pay for their meal, this excited everyone and they were encouraged to ordered more food and drinks.

This moment stuck with me, because it reminded me that I was continuing to practice the spirit of the Ak-Chin people, people who love to help and see people happy.

When I travel, I try to go out of my way to help anyone. For example, if I see a homeless person, I'll get them food and say a prayer for them. This is something I've been doing for the past 11 years.

Can you name at least one favorite person you have met?

The late Leona Kakar. with say great admiration, Leona to me was a great leader and the best Ak-Chin has ever had. I learned so much from her. When I first got on council, I was in the office next to hers, so this gave me the opportunity to spend time with her before she retired. She taught me so much and told me great stories of my grandparents, Ak-Chin's history and how to be a leader.

Of course, I can't forget about my grandfather Jonas, my three brothers; Norbert Peters Sr. (bað), David Peters Sr. (bað), and Cecil Peters; as well as Milton "Paul" Antone (bað), childhood buddy Stanley Antone, and my will take time. I just want to make sure that I helped the next group of leaders stay on the path of what was given to me.

I'm a piece of the puzzle in our continued efforts to provide and give our people the best that we can.

How often do you travel?

I've traveled a number of times during my 11 years on Council. The first two years I had the opportunity to be guided on travel from the late Terry Enos and Vice-Chairman William Antone. These traveling opportunities were to get me acclimated and familiar with some of the organizations we were involved with, from the National Congress of American Indians (NCIA), National Indian Gaming Association (NIGA), Selfto Governance.

As I became Chairman, I was invited to speak at various conferences throughout the United States, representing our community, telling our story from farming and gaming. I traveled also to not only represent my community, but to speak and advocate for other tribes throughout the United States. For the past 9 years, I've only traveled when invited to speak at conferences, sessions, and to testify before Congress, on behalf of my community.

I have been fortunate that my voice and opinions have been identified as a leader of interest, who could not only represent Ak-Chin, but Indian Country overall. My fellow tribal leaders in Indian Country have selected me to sit on national boards and organizations, and to

have you seen in the community since you have been on council?

have been on council? I see the community working together more; in the process of making things better for everyone. There have improvements been healthcare, in our improvements in the different departments in the community, more programs accessible to a number of people, great assistance to Ak-Chin's youth, etc.

With this improvement I understand there will be more to come as the younger generations get into the workforce, bringing the simple way of life into the modern world.

How do you balance your home-life with your work schedule?

That's a hard question. When you are in a position of leadership, it's hard to balance. It's hard being away from my family and at times I felt alone, because I was trying to do good for my people but I couldn't help feeling the way I did.

But in the end, it was necessary for me that I continue to work hard for my people. My youngest daughter was three when I first got on council; Stella is now 14. I had missed milestones regarding her growth, but she and my family understood what the position required. They were very supportive as they adjusted to my schedule and being away from home. They all understood what I was doing, and that was being a public servant to Ak-Chin and the people.

When you do have moments to spend with your family, you take full advantage of them and cherish them while you

can. I enjoy just being

their businesses/firms.

But again, I will weigh the opportunities and options and see where it leads me.

What is some good advice that someone gave you?

Failure is a part of success; if you're afraid to fail, you'll never succeed. Meaning, you are going to make mistakes in life and you have to learn from those mistakes to make yourself better to reach success. It is also important to be yourself, and in being yourself, you will be/do great, which I try to live by.

What advice can you share with others about serving their community?

Know your community; from knowing your land base, knowing the history of our community, what your people are about and who they are. Go and visit them and listen to their issues and concerns, especially with those who are not visible at community gatherings, they too have a voice and need to be heard.

Also, to be consistent and tell Ak-Chin's story. If you want to connect with your past and history and feel the presence of former members who are no longer with us, go out and visit the farm, their spirit is out there. Farming is who we are.

What have you learned about the community and its members during your time on council?

We have community members who are very smart and self-driven in providing a bright future in their endeavors and for their community. That passion for bettering yourself is evident with our community employees who've gained upper management status from being directors and supervisors within respective departments, or even for those gaining employment for a better way of life for themselves and their family.

t What advice would you give about the upcoming election?

Your vote counts. If you don't vote and a candidate who you may have a difference of opinion with is elected, then you may acknowledge that you may have played a role in not getting your candidate into office.

In the past couple of years, I've witnessed a number of young community members register to vote, which is great. Your vote and voice, truly does matter.

What advice would you share with those who are interested in serving on council?

When you are eligible and if you have an interest, do it! Being a Tribal Leader is one of greatest honors I've ever had in my life. The opportunity to advocate and represent your community and even Indian Country on a county, state, and national, global level is the opportunity to continue to close the gap between tribes and government, the who for centuries have been lacking in providing the services that we deserve and are obligated to receive.

Overall, I know that there are great leaders out in our community who will continue to take us to a bright future. But two things I can give you; know your community, and be yourself.

What have you learned about yourself during your time on council?

When I was first elected onto Council 11 years ago, I was advised to sit back and learn as much as I can during my first

You each entrusted me in doing all I can to try and make your lives better. Sapo





- 3. When two objects interact, they apply forces to each other of equal magnitude and opposite direction.












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
