Native Veterans After Administration Removes from Phoenix Veterans' Hospital

Phoenix, AZ – Arizonans were dismayed to find out that the flags representing the 22 federally-recognized Tribes in Arizona were <u>removed</u> from the Carl T. Hayden Phoenix

Administration Medical Center in Phoenix. After the flags were left with the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community, they were entrusted to the Governor by

Tribal leaders. In recognition of the service Tribal Veterans have delivered to their state and their country, Governor Hobbs will display the Tribal flags in the Executive Tower rotunda.

Opening of Desert Willow Housing

For months, there has been a new housing development in the works that will soon hold 60 homes and two parks. Welcome, Desert Willow to Ak-Chin, located just south of the Ak-Chin Parks and Recreation gym!

These houses have been going up since before the start of the Masik Tas Celebrations, with the two parks and road work being completed prior to the construction of the homes.

It's expected that all tenants

will be moved in by August 2025, having signed up for homes through the Ak-Chin Housing Department. Three tenants will be doing walkthroughs of their homes every Friday until all homes are filled.

There are two types of homes, 3-bedroom homes at 2374 sq. ft. and 4-bedrooms at 2650 sq. ft.; both with a 2-car garage. Overall, the homes are modern in style, with grey wood flooring and matching cabinetry in the kitchen and

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




The market featured hundreds of booths filled with incredible Indigenous artwork, including paintings, jewelry, pottery, leatherwork, and clothing.

Cultivating the Future: Desert Sunrise High School Celebrates Greenhouse Grand Opening

Maricopa, Az – With a vision rooted in hands-on learning and real-world experience, Desert Sunrise High School celebrated the grand opening of its new greenhouse on Thursday, March 27.

The welcomed event approximately 30 guests, including Governing Board Vice President Patti Coutre, Mayor Nancy Smith, City Councilmember Ann Marie Knorr, Pinal County School Jill Superintendent Broussard, Pinal County Rich Supervisor Vitiello, former Ak-Chin Chairman Robert Miguel and NAACP President Constance Jackson.

The greenhouse marks a major milestone of the MUSD AgriScience program, which launched four years ago and continues to expand opportunities for students interested in agriscience, sustainability, and animal care and management.

Construction began las

summer, and today's celebration showcased the culmination of that effort. FFA student officers hosted the event and ran interactive stations, offering attendees a glimpse into the exciting future of the program.

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Once fully operational, the greenhouse will feature a wide variety of plants and serve as a central hub for agricultural learning. Just outside, adjacent animal pens are being developed to support the school's expanding livestock care and management program, where students will raise and show animals as part of their coursework and competitions.

"This greenhouse is more than a structure, it's a living lab where students grow not just plants, but skills that will carry them into future careers," said Principal Phil Verdugo.




Not only did the group get the option to ask questions, they were given tote bags and a lunch of cheese enchiladas with rice and beans.



the waitlist and a copy of your application will be sent to the Council Secretary as a backup.

Currently, the waitlist for homes has reached 170 members, but will be reduced to 110 once all tenants enter their new homes.

If you are expecting an apartment, have no worries as construction on the new apartment building is expected to

start in April/ May of this year; depending on if there are no setbacks and will last for a year.

Apartment applications can also be picked up at Ak-Chin Housing, though you will only be put on the waitlist for one or the other, pending the approval of the Housing Board.

We can't wait to hear more about this upcoming project!





Leaders would identify the community I was representing, and they would automatically mention the water settlement we had and Leona.

They

highlight that our water settlement is the best of all water settlements and there would never be a settlement like ours again.

would

After hard work and perseverance, Community's dreams and hopes for a bright future were finally realized, when in the early 80's, its first allotment of water was delivered to the farm/ community.

Leona's brothers, Richard and Buddy, unfortunately had passed prior to the deliverance of water, but Leona was able to be present for the two as the Community celebrated.

Although the induction

event was solely focused on her water and farming accomplishments, is also recognized as a trailblazer in the gaming ventures Indian for Country. She questioned the State

of Arizona and its Director of Gaming (DOG) on restrictions and control of gaming on Tribal Lands. Something I recalled as Leona sat on a panel discussion on gaming during my early days as a photojournalist for the Ak-Chin O'odham Runner.

I remember attending that session and the Director making a statement to the extent that the State was only looking to help tribes with guidelines and policies to help them do things right, and not seem like they were going to control them.

where were you when we really needed you?" Man, she got a standing ovation from the full room of attendees. I remember the Director just looking away, he was speechless.

The week prior to Leona's induction into the Hall of Fame, ABC 15 News 15's Nick Ciletti reached out to the community and family to get permission to do a story on Leona as Woman History Month was celebrated in March.

Ciletti and crew member came out and shot footage of the farm and community and interviewed her daughter Raychel, granddaughter Morgan Peters and myself. The segment was aired a couple of days prior to the Hall of Fame celebration.

Ciletti acknowledged that he didn't know of Leona prior to recording the piece, but was extremely happy to get to know the Ak-Chin Community and Ak-Chin Farms.

"The Farm Bureau sent me a list of people they were honoring and I chose her story." Ciletti said.

The Ak-Chin Community has always been a farming community, it's the backbone of who the Ak-Chin people are. A lot of tribal members have come and gone, but their legacy, identity and spirit continue through the farms.

One of the many things I will always remember and never forget that Leona once told me, was that if I ever wanted to remember, feel and speak with those that have left us, is to "go out into the farm and visit them, they are all out there and are waiting for us to visit them."




