of the San Miguel gates on the Tohono O'odham Nation, was where camp was set up for the night. Surrounded by the desert and roaming scenery livestock, the rich history of the land was truly an experience in itself.

As the sun descended,

we started our first night of praying the rosary, followed with a few group members sharing words of history, purpose, faith, encouragement and support, then it was dinner time. Clear night skies; seeing stars without the interruption of city lights; can really put you to sleep, which was a welcoming opportunity.

As morning came, some were up cooking breakfast for everyone, while others were rolling up their sleeping bags, getting ready to pack up for the trek. In the meantime, new staff lie on the ground, getting blessed, waiting to be picked.

All walkers are given a staff (walking stick) to help them with their journey. Before new walkers picked a staff, it was explained to them how to treat and take care of their staff, treating it as how you would take care of a child.

It was commented that "you take care of your staff and your staff will take care of you."

Following breakfast and the blessing of the staffs, caravan journeyed the starting point, Tubutama, Sonora.

Upon arrival the group was greeted by town members, who prepared luncheon, as it's the town membership's practice in saying "welcome" and "thank you".

Around 3:30 pm, it was

time to start making sure everyone had their staff and backpacks were filled with snacks and water, before lining up for the journey. Participants then began their first day of walking, while a caravan of about ten vehicles filled with supporters went ahead to the next spot for the night.

Over the next four days, the group collaborated to find good spots for the blessing and breakfast for an hour, then lining up and walking for 2 hours or so, then setting up a spot for lunch break.

Afterwards, we would trek for the last set of miles to reach our resting spot for the night.

Every evening consisted of digging small trenches to hold up the staffs for the night, praying a rosary, dinner, and then going to bed.

The mornings entailed of waking up at 4 am, making sure backpacks had snacks, and water in their hydration packs. Then a lineup was organized, which was a routine that was everyone adapted to daily.

Throughout the journey, participants prayed for those in need, and for loved ones who've passed on already.

The pilgrimage also gave thought of self-reflection; focusing on the negative and positive in their lives and paying respects to

Saint Francis.

The pilgrimage was a remarkable experience, as in just a short week, the connections that were made were truly unforgettable; making new friends and meeting relatives that you didn't know about.

Everyone's journey is completely different; some hurt more than others, some don't hurt at all. Some struggle, some don't struggle at all.

But the journey together was an experience of support and unity, which allowed to help one another. experience also allowed the group to offer words of encouragement to one another.

As the group adjusted to the daily routine, it wasn't long before they reached destination, their final Magdalena, Sonora, México. Reaching the church of Saint Francis on October 3rd, was very emotional for everyone; as it meant a moment of relief from the struggles that tried to stop the purpose of completing the journey.

It was also a moment of accomplishment, because you did it, you kept your faith, you prayed for strength, you didn't quit.

Blessings to the Ak-Chin group; Francisco, Kathleen and Connor Miguel, Gabriel Lopez, Sonya Valles-Joaquin-Bencivenga, Jennifer Hill, Dean Peters, Stephanie Burnette, Olena and Steven Hutchinson; and thank you for the prayers of strength, hope and faith that you carried with you on your pilgrimage to Malina.

The crew worked quickly in

Ak-Chin Wastewater Operations,

order to keep the gas pumps from further damage. "Our first priority was to figure out where was the best place to drain and dump the waters from where the pumps are," said Jacolby King Ak-Chin Wastewater Treatment Supervisor.

"Obviously, one of our main concerns were the potential of cross contamination with the water and gas, so timing was of the essence. These things can become hazardous and a safety issue."

During the past few days of rain, many roadways that led to homes were under water, causing homeowners to use alternate routes to get to and from home.

Last Saturday, two community

dances were forced to alter their

events; one moved their event

indoors and the other continued

outdoors, but encountered delays.

Farrell Road was closed going westbound, as Vekol Wash had running water. For the next couple of days, Vekol Wash will be monitored constantly, as experience tells us that rain water that comes from down south usually makes its way down

For the past couple of months, the Ak-Chin Sanitation-Public Works crew have been on a never-ending clean-up project, clearing debris and other vegetation out of Vekol Wash, that have caused waters to back up, causing flooding into farm fields and even near encroachment of community homes.

Sanitation Director commented that with the recent flow of waters down Vekol on Sunday, the project thus far has been successful. "We were a little nervous and

somewhat excited to see what our work has done and how it benefited the community. It was a good amount of water running through, but it was a smooth flow, which was what was needed and what we wanted, so, so far so

We appreciated staff and residents that joined in on the fun.



Trash to Treasure

Upcycle Old Cardboard Boxes into Spooky Graveyard Props



Halloween is the perfect time to get creative with budget-friendly, upcycled decorations. One of the easiest and most fun projects to do with old cardboard boxes is making tombstone decorations to create a spooky graveyard right at home. This simple craft is perfect

for families and can add a chilling touch to your Halloween setup.

What You'll Need:

- · Large cardboard boxes (like cereal or shipping boxes)
- Scissors or a craft knife
- Masking tape or duct tape
- Stone-textured spray paint or gray acrylic paint
- · Black paint or paint pens for details
- Wooden skewers or stakes (for outdoor
- Strong craft glue
- Optional: glitter, fake flowers, or other embellishments
- Clear outdoor sealer (if placing outside)

- 4. Paint Base Layer: Spray the entire tombstone with stone-textured spray paint for a realistic stone effect or use a gray acrylic paint. Allow this base coat to dry completely.
- Decorate the Details: Use black paint or paint pens to add inscriptions like spooky names, dates, or phrases such as "RIP." You can add cracks, chips, or other weathering effects with paint for an aged look.
- 6. Optional Embellishments: Glue on fake flowers, glitter, or use other decorations like small skulls or spider webs for added
- 7. Seal and Protect: If placing outdoors, apply a clear outdoor sealer to protect your tombstone from the weather, ensuring it lasts throughout the season.

Setting Up Your Graveyard

Place your tombstones in your yard by pushing the skewers into the ground firmly. Arrange them with other Halloween props like

skeletons, bones, pumpkins, and spider webs to create a haunting atmosphere. This crafty project not only recycles old materials but provides a fun, hands-on




