A+ Charter School Maricopa secured a seed in the Canyon Athletic Association (CAA) Division I Junior High State Tournament playoffs. On March 2, they overcame Candeo Schools

Peoria, with an upset win, 19-16, advancing to the second-round.

On March 5, the Archers played against the Dream City Christian School from Glendale.

The Archers played with incredible heart and determination, with the full support of community and friends behind them all the way.

At the final buzzer, the young Archers left it all

on the court, with the game's final score, 13-39. The team's overall record was 8 wins and 5 losses.

11-year-old Ariel, who is the daughter of Jose and Alexis Lopez, granddaughter of Gwen Pilone and great-granddaughter of Carole Lopez and Evelina Manuel, was the starting point guard for the Archers. She averaged 6 points, 2 steals, 4 assists, and 5 rebounds per game this season.

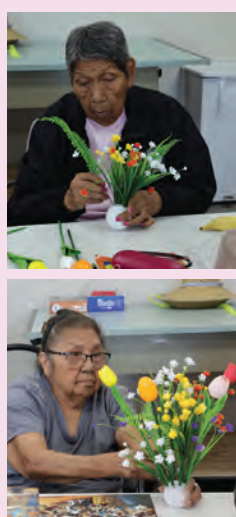

HDS Attends ABIL Conference in Las Vegas

On March 22, 2026, several HDS (Harrah's Development System) Associates attended the American Indigenous Business Leaders (AIBL) Conference in Las Vegas.

The 2026 AIBL National Business & Leadership Student Conference, focused on empowering Indigenous students through financial

literacy, professional networking, and developing management skills. It also featured student competitions and leadership workshops.

HDS Associates, Misty Quintero, Johnny Perkins and Reginald (Reggie) Delores had the opportunity to participate in RES (Reservation Economic Summit)

breakout sessions. In the session, "Modern Indigenous Cuisine: Storytelling, Sovereignty, & Scale", it featured inspiring stories from four chefs. The chefs talked about their journey in culinary school, working in five-star Michelin rated restaurants and their obstacles during 2020 with COVID in each of their businesses.

Each Chef brought their stories back to their communities, how something simple as food can provide medicine in many different ways of healing, knowledge, joy and labor of love.

The HDS Program not only provides work experience for qualified Ak-Chin tribal members, but it also provides a supporting role in the areas of professional training, leadership development,

career growth, and cultural awareness. These skills were brought to life and out of the usual department meeting environment to be seen on a larger scale- the Associates observed student's ability to conduct public speaking to a room of 200+ people. They also observed how supportive the panel judges were with their feedback during each competition.

Each Associate observed how AIBL Chapters across Indian Country are finding ways to help their reservations with prepared business plan ideas, such as, assisting native businesses with online consignment shops to local coffee shops that offer hired student tutors for their college campuses.

The conference was an encouraging and eye-opening experience for

the HDS Associates, the team is now looking forward to their continued participation with all future AIBL events.

The Associates were asked what they learned, liked or how the experience had an impact, "I liked AIBL, there were a lot of different people talking about how they want to improve their community." Reggie commented.

"AIBL impacted my life by knowing that more indigenous youth are trying their best to build a better community, than letting their rez continue to struggle.", Misty shared.

"I learned that Natives have a lot of opportunities with events like AIBL/RES, with networking and mentorships. The culinary breakout session pushed me to pursue my culinary career." said Johnny.

Phoenix 99 Spot Landing Contest

Saturday April 4, the Phoenix 99s landed back in Maricopa for the 9th Annual Spot Landing Contest, which started at 9am and took place at the Ak-Chin Regional Airport.

Three judges collected scores for the contest, based off of a painted diamond and lines that were depicted on the runway.

The point system set up for the landing area was 25 points for landing in

the 75-foot area before the diamond, 100 points could be scored if pilot landed in the 15-foot diamond, another 50 points could be scored if the pilot landed in the 30-foot area before and after the diamond, and 15 points for landing in the 75-foot area after the diamond.

So, to put it in perspective the main goal was to stop in the 15-foot diamond.

There were thirteen competitors in all,

with each getting two attempts landing the perfect score, and about 30 spectators cheering on the competitors throughout the day.

Ak-Chin Airport manager, Tim Costello was asked how the event went, "From our perspective the event went really well. The weather was perfect with a light wind down the runway."

Tim was also asked if he thought the spot landing was a hard task, "I know it's a hard task. To get a pilot certificate, the student pilot has to demonstrate they can land on a spot that is 200 feet long.

Once they have the certificate, they may not practice the spot landing again. In this

competition, the scoring area is 255 feet long. But the high scoring center is only 15 feet long.

The winners would have scored by landing in this very precise, bullseye. This is coupled with the aircraft flying are moving at about 45 MPH at the time of landing and have different wind effects going on. They would also need to be consistent --- get two good scores to win."

A little bit about the Phoenix 99s, they are a chapter of THE NINETY-NINES, INC. an international organization of licensed women pilots from 44 countries, that promotes advancement of aviation through education, scholarships and mutual support while honoring our unique history and

sharing our passion for flight.

The Phoenix Chapter is part of the Southwest Section of the Ninety-Nines with more than 2,000 members and is the largest section (regional group) of the Ninety-Nines, from Arizona, California, Hawaii Nevada and Utah.

The Phoenix 99's host many events, including the Spot Landing Contest geared to bring pilots and their supporters together for a day of friendly competition, while honing in on their piloting skills and landing proficiencies. PROJECT CONSTRUCTION NOTICE for WATER SERVICE LINE REPLACEMENT 266 HOMES, AK-CHIN INDIAN COMMUNITY RESIDENTIAL SUBDIVISIONS

Project Description:
 This project will replace the water service lines between houses and the water mainline for 266 houses throughout the Ak-Chin Indian Community in Maricopa Arizona. The service waterline replacement will include new service tap connection to the water mainline and installing new water meters. The old service line will be disconnected and the old water meter will be removed. The disturbed areas within the construction limits will be resorted to original position.

Purpose of the Project:
 This project will replace the old service lines with new more dependable water service lines and new water meters. The project will improve the water service quality to the houses by minimizing water line breaks and repeated repairs on the old service waterlines.

Safety Precaution:
 During construction activities, residents should be careful around the construction areas and moving construction equipment.

Timeline of the Project:
 The project started construction March, 2026, and will continue for 8 months. Currently working in Mesquite subdivision. Water service lines for several houses were successfully replaced. Flyer notices will be distributed to the individual houses prior to starting construction on the houses' new water service lines replacement.

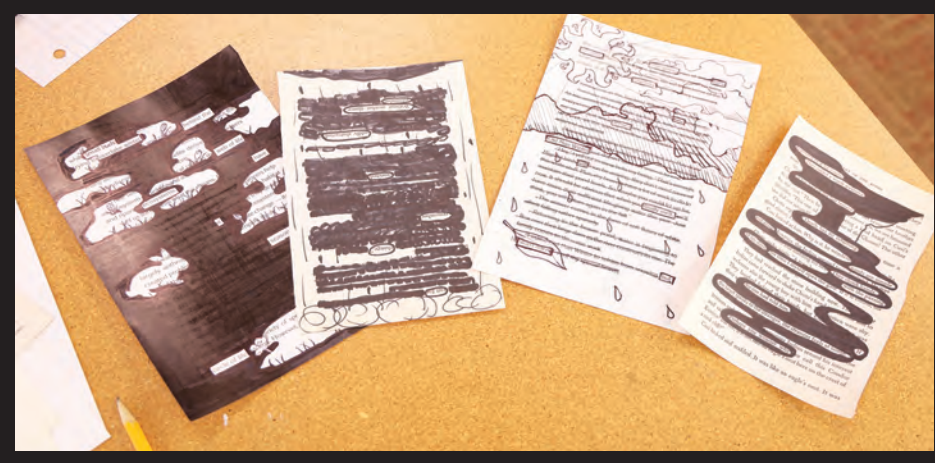
In this process the words you've selected create a poem. If you have a love for poetry, this was the perfect way to try your hand at it.

Throughout the morning and afternoon, those that attended the event, were able to enjoy demonstrators that included; Dwayne Antone and his acrylic painting, Bernice Monte and her traditional basketry making and bead work with Vera Pablo, all taking place inside the museum. Also in the museum, were arts and crafts and other activities that were hosted by museum staff.

Outside, plenty of information booths were set up to hand out material, free prizes and gifts. Information booths included; Ak-Chin's Language, Library, Environmental Protection and Police departments; Gila River HuHugam Heritage Center, San Xavier Co-Op and the Salt River Huhugam Ki.

Craftwork booths included Hohokial, Adella Zabawa and Nui Notions. Food vendors were Elaina Enos who had frybread on their menu,

and Adella Zabawa, who were selling hamburger meals. Jumping castles were also available for children, courtesy of Baba's Bouncers.

Prior to the start of the Him-Dak Celebration, Ak-Chin Tribal Chairman, Gabriel Lopez addressed the crowd by welcoming all to the community and for taking part in the celebration.

Museum Director, Elaine Peters, also elaborated on the celebration and the history of the museum. During her address, she recognized two elders and asked for a moment of silence for the late Benedict Miguel (badt) and Melinda Pete (badt).

Included in their performance, the Juanios Boys, dedicated a song "Indian Cowboy" to Benedict, who the Boys acknowledged as a family member of theirs.

games, the first against a tough Eastern Band of Cherokee from North Carolina. Despite a valiant effort, Ak-Chin couldn't overcome an early deficit against Carolina, who sported players who hovered around 6'5", dominating the court.

The first-round defeat, placed Ak-Chin in the loser's bracket, where they faced Suquamish of Washington state. The boys from the Vekol Wash, played a much better game and stayed within striking distance, but succumbed to defeat and was eliminated from tournament play.

Despite the setbacks, the participation allowed Ak-Chin representatives to explore various places of interest in Spokane, which eased the pain of being eliminated.

Usually, the tournament allows entries to only 64 teams, but due to the high demand from more teams eager to participant and a waiting list the past few years, tournament director and founder, Jerry Ford-Redbone, opened up

twenty more spots this year, so a bracket of 84 teams took to the courts.

One of the more intriguing rules and guidelines of the Battle of the Nations tournament, is that tribal members can only play with the tribe they are enrolled in. Tribal IDs are verified at check in on the first day. At many tournaments, players can play with other tribes as long as they are enrolled

with a Native American tribe.

An enticing incentive for making the journey to participate in the Battle of Nations tourney, are the awards and prizes given to the top four teams. Thousands of dollars, custom Pendleton jackets and a Bison skull trophy were the awards handed out at last year's tournament.
