It is ONLY available to elders 55 years or older. If you are not 55 and over, you will not receive the vaccine.

If the elder is sick or on guarantine, they are not eligible. Please DO NOT come. There will be other events.

Limited vaccines are available so first come, first serve.

CAUTION: there will be waiting and long lines. Bring something to read or do.

Ak-Chin participates in **59th Inaugural** Ceremonies



Ak-Chin Chairman Robert Miauel participates in National Day of Service for the Inauguration of President Biden and Vice President Harris in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The event was streamed on Monday, January 18, 2021.

The 59th Inaugural Ceremonies for President Joseph Robinette Biden Jr. and Vice President Kamala Devi Harris included many historic firsts; electing the first woman of color for the Vice President of the United States; the first time in over 100 years where the outgoing President did not attend his successor's Inauguration, and the first Inauguration to be held virtually, with no large crowds, no Inaugural Ball or Inauguration Parade.

Although many things had to be canceled due to the unprecedented crisis from the COVID pandemic and recent Capitol rioting, there was still light to be found at the end of the tunnel.

"On behalf of the community, I congratulate President Biden and Vice-President Harris as they begin their administration and efforts in moving our country into the positive future we all are striving for. We truly look forward to the next four years and will continue to give our support during this administration."

Other than U.S. Representative Sharice Davids D-Kansas, Chairman Miguel was the only tribal leader from the United States who gave a presentation during the MLK service event.

Following the official election of President-elect Biden, Jr. and Vice President-elect Harris in November of 2020, the Office of Public Engagement team began a two-month plan with a group of dedicated professionals to help in the week-long planning of sessions, festivities and events leading up to the 59th Inaugural Ceremonies.

Over MLK weekend, Ak-Chin Southern Dunes Golf Club was pretty busy, as they played host to Arizona and Arizona State Men's Golf teams. Both teams were competing for bragging rights and the honor of being the first-ever winners of "The Copper Cup".

For two days both teams enjoyed excellent weather and many great rounds of golf at Ak-Chin Southern Dunes topranked course.

The teams played four fourball matches and eight singles matches, similar in format to the Ryder Cup; a three-day tournament held every two years and played between top ranked golfers from the U.S. and Europe.

Due to COVID restrictions, teams everywhere have had to reduce their competition days, causing many disruptions to their overall seasons.

"In a normalized year, two college rivals never really play head to head, against one opponent...in a Ryder Cup style fashion." Kris Strauss, Troon Senior VP shared. "With the pandemic and reduced competition days... this year this is possible...and both programs are coming together, at a world class neutral venue (in Ak-Chin Southern Dunes) to compete for the Copper Cup."

"The Copper Cup will be the first college golf tournament of the spring and a great way to celebrate the Territorial Cup rivalry and the very high level of college golf found in Arizona," notes Sun Devil head coach Matt Thurmond.

"Our team could not be more excited for the opportunity to open up the season in Arizona playing our rivals in a very recognizable Ryder Cup style format," says Arizona head coach Anderson.

"While we all understand the importance of this rivalry and competition, it has been outstanding conceptualizing this idea with Coach Thurmond and the ASU staff along with members of the Ak-

Chin Southern Dunes team, including General Manager Brady Wilson."

At the end of day one, the Wildcats took a 1-point lead, 6.5-5.5. Day two, was pretty tight as both elite clubs worked the course.

Wildcats kept the one-point lead going into the last rounds, but by the end of day two, the Sun Devils would shine on to win the 2021 Copper Cup.

"Both teams had a great time and it came down to the last match on the 18th hole to decide the cup for the Sun Devils 12.5 pts to 11.5 pts." shared Brady Wilson, General Manager of Ak-Chin Southern Dunes.

"The opportunity, in this unique golf year, to host a groundbreaking and unique event that features two of the best college golf programs in the country from right here in our home state, is exciting and hopefully a true silver lining outcome from the limitations that 2020 has brought. The

Democratic National Committee (DNC) Native American Political Director Sheldon reached Theresa out to Chairman Miguel and respectfully requested his participation in the MLK event. Prior to her position with the DNC, Sheldon was a member of the Tulalip Tribal Council in Washington state.

Following his acceptance, Miguel recorded a video with the assistance of the Gila River Indian Community and their telecommunications office, which included staff members, Ruben Riglero and Diana Antone.

"I'd like to personally thank Ruben and Diana for a tremendous job in shooting and producing the video," Chairman Miguel said.

To Ak-Chin Elders,

We hope this notice finds you and your family well. As you know, we are living in very difficult, and sorrowful times due to the COVID 19 pandemic. The Ak-Chin Indian Community is experiencing COVID 19 at the very worst.

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Recently, the Ak-Chin Indian Community reached its highest increase of COVID positive individuals and deaths. For the safety of Community and the Community employees, the Community Council decided to close down most of the Community Operations with the exception of a few departments that are deemed as necessary essential.

The Elder Center is a necessary essential department. In this case, the Elder Center is partially in operation with limited services for everyone's safety. Below is a breakdown of the Elder Center Hours and the Services we are able to provide at this time.

Partial Closure

The Elder Center is operating on limited hours and services. This will

continue until March 1, 2021.

Elder Center Hours

8:00am to 2:00pm Monday through Friday – If you need assistance, please call the Elder Center before 2pm. After 2pm, the Elder Center is closed.

Meal Delivery and Pick Up

The Elder Center is providing breakfast and lunch for delivery to the homebound. For elders that are not homebound and able to drive, we are preparing meals for pick up at the Elder Center.

Breakfast is from 7:30am to 8:30amLunch is from 12:00pm to 1:00p

Elder Center Transportation

Elder Center requires a 48-hour notice for medical transportation requests. The sooner we are notified of your up and coming medical appointment, your ride will be scheduled. Please let us know as far in advance of your transportation request as you can. Providing advanced notice helps you the most. We really appreciate it.

Currently, all Elder Center drivers are

out either due to COVID 19 related matters or medical leave. The Elder Center Transportation staff in now down to only one (1) person. Transportation Supervisor Georgia Corella is working and driving all of the Elder Center's scheduled transportation and requests.

The Elder Center asks that you please be patient with us. We are doing the best we can to provide what is most necessary to the elders that use the Elder Center services. Transportation is certainly here to assist you with your transportation requests. However, please understand, we have to consider those elders who are in the most need.

Elder category considered the highest priority are the following:

- Homebound elders (elders who cannot leave the home without assistance)
- Elders without a car
- Elders who do not or cannot drive
- Elders who do not have a caregiver or family member to drive them to and from their appointment

Gila River Transportation Services

The Elder Center is working closely with Gila River Transportation as well.

Gila River Transportation Services do have eligibility requirements. In most instances, elders are eligible. If you need a ride to a medical appointment and the Elder Center cannot provide one for you, **please call Gila River Transportation Services at 602-528-1384.**

Transportation requests are taken NO later than 2:00 pm the business day (Monday- Friday) prior to your scheduled appointment. This gives Gila River Transportation Services ample time to process your request.

The Elder Center staff will be happy to see you all again. Hopefully, very soon! Please Stay safe.

Ak-Chin ACES

Due to the unprecedented times in 2020, Ak-Chin Energy Services (ACES) took a break from Runner articles about energy and water conservation. We felt that if you were forced to stay home, the last thing members needed was to worry about whether their air conditioner/heater was running too much or the water was left on.

Because of state mandates, the Community saw a dramatic decrease in energy usage from its enterprises (7.4%) but saw a significant increase in residential usage (9.3%). More people worked from home, didn't travel, and had to quarantine.

In 2021, as we move back to a more normal time, ACES feels that it is important to reengage the Resource Conservation Plan. The plan was started in 2017 as a way to increase awareness of the costs the Community bears to provide utility services to its members.

The Community has historically provided these services to its members at no cost, but has been increasingly concerned about whether to continue this policy, especially when some accounts show excessive usage.

Due to the Community paying for all services, some accounts have shown usage in excess of three times what the average Arizonan uses. When people get something for free, it is common for them to put less value on it because it didn't cost them anything to acquire it. This can result in waste when it comes to utilities.

With the continued impact to the service industries, it is important that members do their part to help conserve resources for the Community and the planet. As you stay home and stay safe, we ask that you also continue to conserve when possible.

CASE: PS-01-21: Harrah's Casino and Resort Golf Cart Valet Fence and Gate:

Applicant/Michael Kintner, Harrah's Senior Vice President and General Manager, is requesting Preliminary Site Plan approval to construct approximately 50' of fencing and gates (two electronic sliding, one manual swinging) to secure the golf cart valet charging and parking area. The fencing and gates will be positioned between the existing ten-story hotel and screen block wall at the north and south portions of the screen block wall.

CASE: PS-02-21: Harrah's Casino and Resort Chop Block N' Brew Outdoor Woodshed:

Applicant/Michael Kintner, Harrah's Senior Vice President and General Manager, is requesting Preliminary Site Plan approval to construct a 72 square feet outdoor metal woodshed for storage of firewood for Harrah's Chop Block & Brew restaurant. The shed is proposed within the golf cart charging area adjacent to an existing screen block wall.

Are you recycling right? Environmental Protection Department employee Ross Stimac says that although Ak-Chin community members are doing a better job recycling the proper items in their curbside bins, recycling facilities are expecting lower contamination rates.

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Non-recyclable items can lead to higher sorting costs for the recycling facilities, ruin other recyclable material, and cause possible load rejections when the Sanitation Department transports and disposes the recyclables at the local recycling facility.

To promote recycling the proper way, the Ak-Chin Environmental Protection Department conducts random recycling audits. The purpose of these visual curbside evaluations is to help residents be more careful on what materials they are putting in the bins and teach households on what materials can and can't be placed in the bins.

If you put too much of the wrong items in your recycling bin, you will be issued an "oops" tag.

However, if you have relatively low contamination in your bin, we will place a "thanks" for doing a great job tag.

The most common NONrecyclable items found in the curbside bins are plastic bags. Plastic bags of any kind are NOT recyclable at curbside. Plastic

bags can be returned and recycled at retail stores such as Bashas, and Walmart but NOT in the curbside bins.

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Other items that are not at curbside recyclable but routinely show up are Styrofoam, construction wood, chip bags, plastic toys, and other non-recyclable plastic.

It is important to only place the following items in the recycling barrel (clean, dry, and unbagged).

- Cardboard (remove all packaging)
- Paper (newspaper, magazines, mail)
- Metal/aluminum and food cans
- Plastic (only plastic bottles with the #1 or #2 symbol)

COVID and Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome in Children (MIS-C)

WHAT IS MIS-C?

Multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children (MIS-C) is a condition where different body parts can become inflamed, including the heart, lungs, kidneys, brain, skin, eyes, or gastrointestinal organs. MIS-C is very rare and the overall incidence was 11.4 cases per 100,000 population. We do not yet know what causes MIS-C. However, we know that many children with MIS-C had the virus that causes COVID-19, or had been around someone with COVID-19. MIS-C can be serious, even deadly, but most children who were diagnosed with this condition have gotten better with medical care.

MIS-C STATS IN CHILDREN:

- Most cases were in children and adolescents between the ages of 1 and 14 years, with an average age of 8 years.
- More than 70% of reported cases have occurred in children who are Hispanic or Latino (554 cases) or Black, Non-Hispanic (499 cases).
- 99% of cases (1,638) tested positive for SARS CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. The remaining 1% were around someone with COVID-19.
- Most children developed MIS-C 2-4 weeks after infection with SARS-CoV-2.

Contact your child's doctor, nurse, or clinic right away if your child is showing symptoms of MIS-C:

MIS-C Symptoms



BE AWARE THAT NOT ALL CHILDREN WILL HAVE ALL THE SAME SYMPTOMS.

Seek emergency care right away if your child is showing any of these emergency warning signs of MIS-C or other concerning signs: *Trouble breathing, Pain or pressure in the chest that does not go away, New confusion, Inability to wake or stay awake, Bluish lips or face, Severe abdominal pain, and Swelling of limbs*

Doctors may do certain tests to look for inflammation or other signs of disease. These tests might include: *Blood tests, Chest x-ray, Heart ultrasound (echocardiogram), Abdominal ultrasound.*

Doctors may provide supportive care for symptoms (medicine and/or fluids to make your child feel better) and may use various medicines to treat inflammation. Most children who become ill with MIS-C will need to be treated in the hospital. Some will need to be treated in the pediatric intensive care unit (ICU).

How to Protect Children from COVID-19

To prevent the spread of COVID–19 amongst children and young adults, it is necessary to continue to practice the following prevention methods:

- Do not gather with members outside your household
- Stay home as much as possible
- When you go out, wear a mask and practice physical distancing
- Children over 2 years old should wear a mask in public
