Exceptional Community Hospital will be located on the northwest corner of SR347 and Honeycutt

18, Arizona Governor Doug Ducey, Arizona Department of Health Director, Dr. Cara Christ, and Arizona National Guard Major General Michael McGuire provided an update on Arizona's stand on COVID-19, including new actions

and guidelines for the holidays.

Dr. Christ began by providing an update on the latest COVID-19 numbers, "To date a total of 283,102 cases have been reported to public health, and sadly we've lost 6,365 Arizonans to COVID."

focused on the importance of masking up, "Masks work, please wear them." Ducey encouraged.

The new study from the Centers for Disease Control released last week confirmed that wearing a mask not only protects those around you, but it also protects you from infectious droplets of others.

Dr. Christ also asked all Arizonans to make plans for a safer Thanksgiving gathering.

"The holidays can bring together more households and more generations, including older individuals who are more vulnerable to COVID-19 and young adults and children who are more likely to be asymptomatic carriers. Following these simple guidelines (below) can help keep everyone safe during the holidays."

With out of state travelers on the rise for the winter, Ducey and Christ will be beefing up on public service announcements at Phoenix Sky Harbor, Tucson International and Phoenix-Mesa Gateway airports. They will continue to stress the wearing of masks as well as where to get tested so everyone in Arizona knows what steps to take to protect themselves and their loved ones.

To help curb the increase in COVID-19 cases in the schools, emergency measures will be issued to make sure schools implement policies for mask wearing not only in the classrooms but also on school grounds and school buses.

Governor Ducey commended front-line workers, as he designated \$25 million dollars to boost hospital staffing and award bonuses for their dedication.

He also talked about "a positive light at the end of the tunnel," with the news of a possible vaccine being available soon.

Maj. Gen. McGuire provided an update on the Arizona National Guard.

"As the Governor mentioned today just short of 730 (Guardsmen) are still on duty and

intend to continue to serve the community with our primary lines of effort in food security and sustainment in the missions that we're doing with food bank, food distribution to rural areas and tribal communities. and continue to use our small but mighty medical taskforce to work with nursing homes, tribal public health partners. school nurses and the rest."

McGuire also reported an increase of volunteers, "to show you that this is the next greatest generation, in a typical quarter we shoot to recruit 90 guardsmen... In the quarter from June ending in September we were able to bring in 163 youngsters that want to serve proudly as volunteers in the Arizona Guard."

Before Ducey fielded questions from the press, he reiterated what Christ shared earlier, "We have lost 6,365 individuals to COVID-19 in the state of Arizona. Each one is an Arizonan, and I'd ask that you please join me in a moment of silence, prayer and reflection for them and their families."

and discussion.

Questions submitted ranged from: community finances, water rights, CARES act, legal issues, job security, leadershipeducation-experience, welfare for non-resident members, substance abuse, education, culture, language, violation of policies, COVID pandemic, travel bans, healthcare, safety, depression, recreational marijuana, housing, member employment opportunities, communication, and enrollment.

Candidates seemed to be comfortable in the setting. "The forum was a new experience, but one that was well organized." Shared Chairman Miguel.

Vice-Chairman Lopez shared, "With the global pandemic issue, the safety and health concerns for everyone, candidates, elections committee, all those who helped with the live feed and most of all, members of the community. The set up was great. It is unfortunate that during this time of a pandemic we had to take these extreme measures."

Candidate Narcia-Miranda shared, "The virtual Meet the Candidates event was brilliant. It was the safest method for our membership to participate and hear from all the candidates. The set up was professional and the team working on site did a fantastic job organizing, providing direction, and feedback during the sessions. There was a slight technology glitch, which the team was able resolve and successfully get us back on track."

Candidate Lemuel Vincent shared, "The event set up was of course different in the way "Meet the Candidate Night" was presented but due to our current pandemic situation I totally understand. There was some hiccups at first but the issues were taken care of. For me I just treated it as a conference interview which I have been in before."



Choosing water, coffee or tea instead of fruit juice, soda, or other sugar sweetened beverages, eating at least three servings of vegetable including every day,

This two-part event, first started November 11th-15th with a Virtual Friendly Rival Run/




