



Unity Run brings prayers to Ak-Chin

The sound of over a hundred pairs of shoes hitting the road were heard on Farrell road. Runners moving west toward Milton Paul Antone Memorial Park. The annual Unity Run of the four O'odham tribes arrived in Ak-Chin on Monday afternoon, March 18.

Two runners, one carrying a staff, ran across State Route 347 on Farrell Road at 3:02 pm. Accompanying them was Ak-Chin Vice-Chairman Gabriel Lopez on horseback and also carrying a staff.

Another two runners awaited the trio by the Ak-Chin Youth Council office, and in relay style fashion, took the staff and began running until the next hand off by the Ak-Chin Fire department, which had three runners waiting.

Signs made by the Youth Council greeted the runners and group assisting the runners. A large welcome was placed at the Community's entrance and signs of

encouragement and thanks were visible along Farrell road.

The largest group of the Unity Run were ready to run into the main village, waiting at the wash next to the IS/Capital Projects building. Over a hundred strong, they came from Gila River, Salt River and Tohono O'odham Nation to participate in the week-long event that began at Red Mountain on the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community on Sunday, March 16.

There was a pause for nearly an hour as the group waited for the group of runners that were coming from the west from San Lucy district. When they arrived, the three runners handed off the staff to the Ak-Chin Unity runners who led the entire group in.

Ak-Chin member Kelly Antone carried the staff, running and leading everyone west to the park. Along the way, cars honked

their horns and both members and employees from different departments cheered them on as they stood by the road. Helping in front of and back of the runners were the Ak-Chin Police department and Fire department.

Kelly, Daria Garcia and others ran into the park, toward the concession stand and around the east field toward the grass next to the irrigation canal where the campsite was set up.

Welcoming the Runners were Ak-Chin Vice-Chairman Gabriel Lopez, Council member Delia Antone and Community member Yolanda Miranda.

In their remarks, they thanked everyone, offering encouragement and welcomes to Ak-Chin. There was also a singing of "Happy Birthday" to Kelly Antone, who's birthday was that day.

The Ak-Chin Community Events department assisted in all preparations, with

dinner served in the Ak-Chin Recreation Center gym and breakfast the next day.

The next morning, the Unity Run continued their journey south, heading to the Tohono O'odham Nation. Continuing to assist were Ak-Chin Fire and Police departments. Ak-Chin had runners who continued on.

The group was welcomed in Cockerburr for lunch and met with the Community members and elders. On hand was Tohono O'odham veteran Joe Joaquin and TON Council member Lucinda Allen.

The Unity Run has been in existence for over two decades. Established as a way to "unite, preserve, strengthen offer prayers for our respective nations," and "to instill the tradition of running and respect through the teaching of our himdag (way of life)," this year's Run coincided with many school district's spring breaks and

Being a part of MEDA and the discussions regarding economic growth and development will be a benefit to all of us."

Piestewa Fallen Heroes Memorial brings reunion, honoring of fallen

For two days in March, she and her fellow fallen are remembered. The Piestewa Fallen Heroes Sunrise Memorial, held annually to honor Army SPC. Lori Ann Piestewa and those who paid the ultimate sacrifice, were honored at the base of Piestewa Peak early morning on Saturday, March 23, 2019.

The event marks the sixteenth anniversary of that fateful day in 2003 when Lori became the first Native American woman killed in combat, while deployed in Iraq with the 507th Maintenance Company out of Fort Bliss, Texas. A single mother of two from the Hopi Tribe, Lori was 23 years old.

Her children, Brandon and Carla are now young adults having been raised

The skyline in Sacaton forever changed when the 100 year old C. H. Cook Memorial Presbyterian Church was destroyed in a fire on Monday, March 25.

The vacant church, registered as a historic landmark, was a gathering place for generations of Gila River members.

Ak-Chin elder Mildred Thomas, who attended the church with her mother as a child, was in Sacaton and sadly watched it burn. One of her granddaughters was married in the church.

A prayer service was held on Friday, March 29 that brought together over 300 individuals, some who

serving the ball. With four games taking place all at the same time, hearing the correct whistle was challenging.

The Fort McDowell community were gracious hosts for the Senior Games, with tribal elders coming

from as far as Hualapai in northwest Arizona, Tohono O'odham Nation, and several tribes from Southern California.

and veteran families.

Volunteer organizers began the Memorial with an Evening Reception for Families of Fallen Heroes and Candlelight Vigil the evening before on Friday, March 22. Held at the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Phoenix, ABC15 morning co-anchor Kaley O'Kelley served as emcee of the program.

Flute music by Randy Kemp echoed in the dinner hall as guests arrived. After a welcome, a Presentation and Posting of Colors, and Pass and Review of Honor Guard units attending took place.

The back wall featured photos of

Bart informed the members of the recent Central Arizona Project maintenance and water shutdown about a year ago. He then shared that Council appointed Ak-Chin Environmental to conduct research on implementing a second water source for the community as CAP informed that they would be doing another maintenance and water shutdown in September-October.

With a critical September deadline to have second water source, the community has decided to revitalize the old well right by the old justice facility. Smith said, "it's been inactive (and) we are going to reactive that" also sharing that although it's not going to hold enough water for the shutdown there would be a water back up there if we need it.

Bart also discussed modifications to our surface water treatment plant that is currently undergoing some design and implementations so that it goes through the P&Z process by September so that we will have it up and running as a second water source. It will need to go through a

filtration system in order to provide drinking water for the community because there are a lot of nitrates in the water.

Bart then shifted his discussion on to the El Paso Gas easement which is expiring in July. Bart shared how the El Paso Gas has a huge line running through the community, as well as the sensitive area along the wash and with the rain we had last year during October the erosion exposed this line. He also pointed out that the Community is in negotiations with El Paso Gas about the renewed easement. Smith finished up by saying he would have more to share over the couple months on the process.

COM Smith then talked about the Community's administration building, "We're going to do some redesigning of it, kind of scale it down a little bit more." Smith also shared that the costs of that building had skyrocketed, so the community is planning to meet with department heads over the next couple months, along with council to do some re-figuration of the building.

Bart also informed the membership about the community vehicle and equipment assessment. "We looked at 34 vehicles that the departments have identified that weren't working or needs work, from that assessment we determined that we do have some vehicles that need to be deposed of so we're going to have a public auction here soon."

In attendance at the dinner were Lori's comrades, PFC Jessica Lynch, SPC Joseph Hudson, SPC Shoshana Johnson, and PFC Patrick Miller.

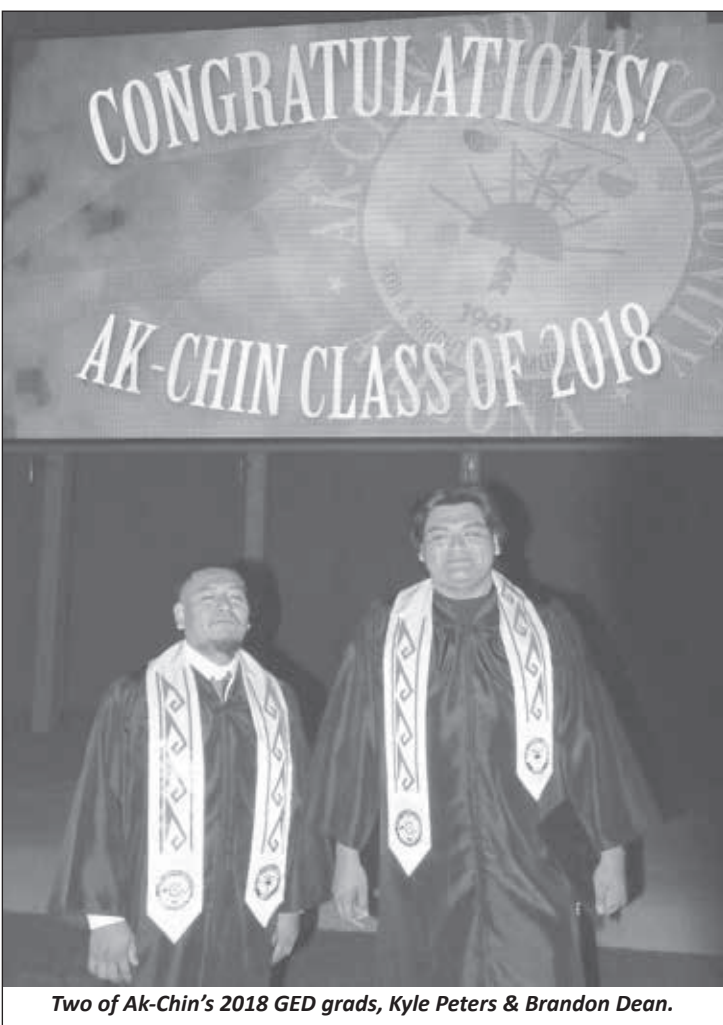

home, and determination to stick with it, all come into play.

At the start of each year, the Ak-Chin Education Department holds a graduation ceremony for all the prior year's GED graduates, in conjunction with the Higher Education banquet. The 2018 GED graduates were honored at the annual GED Graduation and Higher Education banquet earlier this month, and the 2018 GED graduates could not be a more perfect example of the diversity that can exist in terms of a GED completion timeline.

The ceremony took place at Elements Event Center and was a long time coming for GED graduates, Brandon Dean and Kyle Peters. However, graduates, Anthony Quintero, Jr. and Byron White, were a stark contrast to the long-term dedication exhibited by the other two 2018 graduates. While Byron and Anthony completed the GED program within only a few short months, Kyle and Brandon were in the program for several years, which can be the case for some students. Again, GED

completion time frame depends on many factors for adult students, and some students may leave the program for a time and then return again, later down the line. However, what matters most, in the long run, is that students do return and follow through with what they started. While most students would likely prefer to be the one that completes within a few weeks or months, it is important to realize that long-term commitment and determination is something to be proud of as well. Our 2018 GED graduates demonstrate that whether it takes a few months or a few years, a diploma is something worth achieving, and all four graduates should be extremely proud of their accomplishments.

When GED students first set foot in the Ak-Chin GED office, one of the first questions they ask of GED Instructor, Desiree Guarino, is, "How long will it take to get my GED?" This is not a question that can be easily answered. The current version of the GED exam is by no means an easy test. So, this is a question that needs to be reflected back onto the student. It is then common for the instructor to ask students, "How quickly do you want to get your GED?" That is because the pace depends on the individual student. Factors such as length of time out of school, academic levels coming into the program,

Bart also talked about the opening of Smith Road, which will lead to the new cultural modular behind the Recreation. Bart informed the road was scheduled to be available by April 2.

He also shared information on the used computer raffle that Information Systems had put out. Used computers will be raffled for \$50-dollars. 40 computers that were previously located in community departments will be available. He also mentioned the deadline to turn in a raffle ticket was Friday, March 29. Tickets were available through Information Systems department, in the Capital Projects building.

Bart then provided an update about upcoming events: Him-Dak Celebration April 6, Rabies vaccinations on April 10 at Ak-Chin fire station, Community Clean-Up on April 27, Special Olympics bowling night April 28, and the World Long Drive April 12-16.

The last item Bart discussed was they summer program for youth workers which is taking applications now. He also reminded everyone about the next community meeting, scheduled for April 29th at 6pm.

After COM Smith concluded his updates, Charles "Chuck" McCarty, Executive Director for the Ak-Chin Tribal Gaming Agency stepped forward to provide his presentation.

Chuck began by saying, "It's been about a year since I was here to brief you guys last time." Sharing that his presentation was going to be a brief follow-up to discuss "who we are, how we operate and who are

commission is and how we organize and so forth."

Chuck remembered the last time he presented was on PowerPoint he didn't have anything to offer. So, this time he printed out an informational packet for everyone.

Chuck then went over the regulatory act, which also talked about the different types of gaming compacts available through the state or federal, sharing that Ak-Chin currently operates under the 2002 compact, which he said they had to re-write and update the gaming code in 2008, which took about two and half years. So, now Ak-Chin Gaming now has three documents that they utilize to enforce.

McCarty then went over the Ak-Chin Tribal Gaming Agency and its core responsibilities; including maintaining the integrity of gaming for the state of Arizona and to make sure Ak-Chin does not lose its right to have a gaming license.

Chuck then went over the different departments that comprise Ak-Chin TGA, and the total number of staff members. "We operate twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, non-stop." After sharing how many were community members, he proudly stated "we are a very diverse organization and we have a very strong cohesive unit" and "we are probably one of the premier regulatory agencies in the nation, certainly in this state."

He went over the operations of the different departments and duties of staff members; enforcement, compliance, auditing, licensing and

investigation.

Afterwards, Chuck provided information on the five-member gaming commission, pointing out that this year marks the first time Ak-Chin has had an all-female commission.

He then opened it up for questions, which focused on the gaming compact, commission meetings and sports betting.

Chairman Miguel thank Chuck for his presentation and reminded everyone about the food in the back before bringing up Community Services Manager, Nicole Carlyle-Coester who presented the results of the Community Language survey that was launched in January. She informed everyone about the purpose of survey, which was to gather data on what the community likes about the language program and what could be in proved on.

Council provided updates on: water hearing, NABI, Tom O'Halleran function, Council meeting with Banner Health about insurance, AIGA meetings, Internet for housing, opening of Smith Road, Admin building issues, talks about submitting new tax code, hemp symposium, sponsorship contracts and financials, special Olympic bowling and torch run, and casino event center.

After council gave their updates everyone helped clean up the service center and a raffle was held.

When asked what led to her decision to retire, Ruby said she wanted time to “take care of myself and have some fun.” An active member of

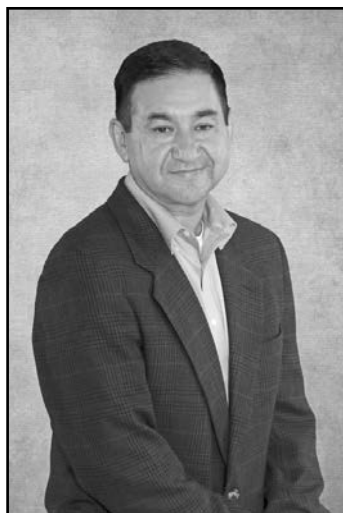
the Ak-Chin Hu’hu’jud chair volleyball team, “Now I can go,” she said when the team travels to tournaments near and far.

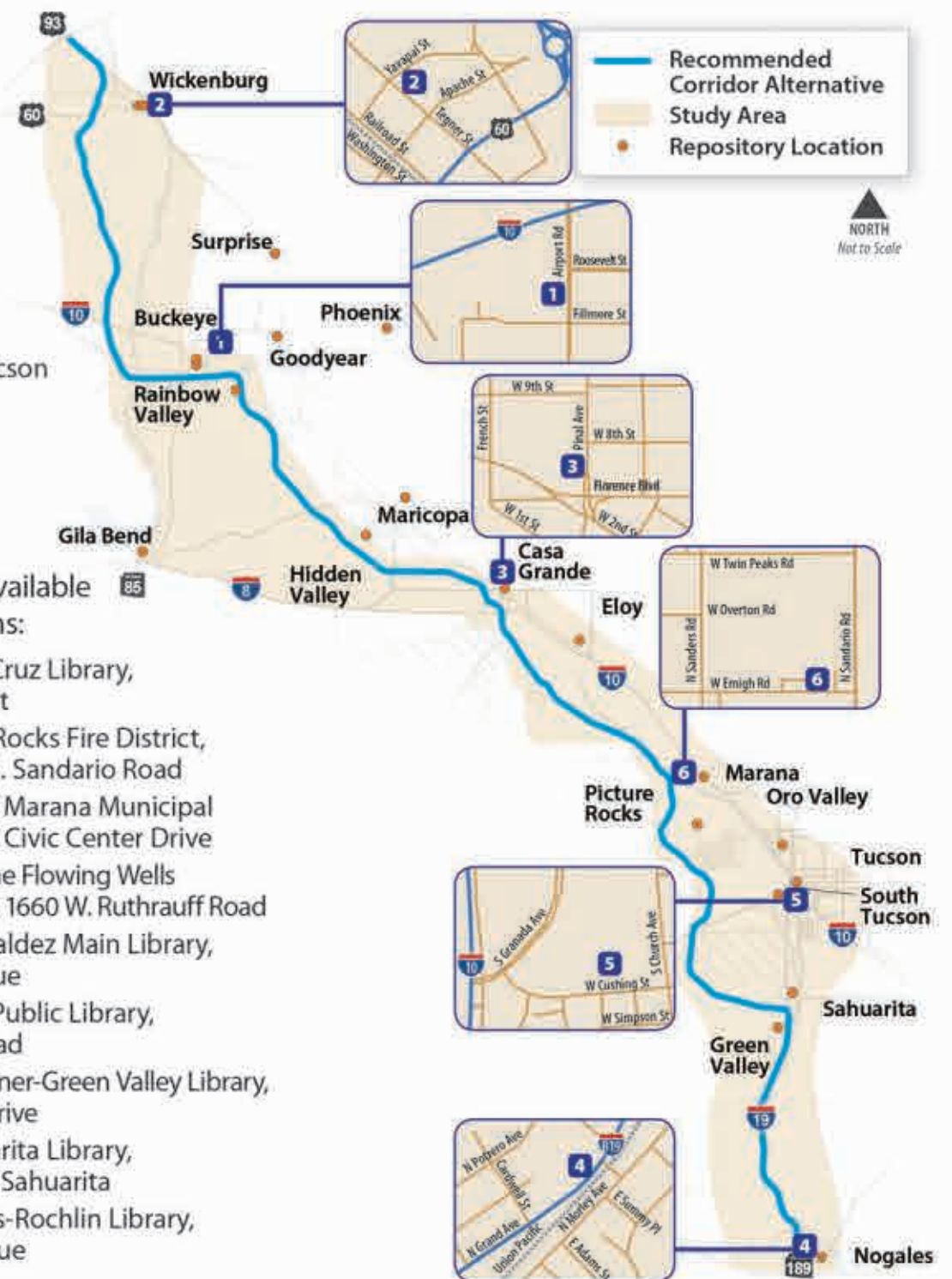
