The 2022 Native American Basketball Invitational kicked off with a weeklong schedule of games played at seven valley locations, as well as an educational summit and NABI championships played at the Footprint Center Pavilion in downtown Phoenix.

Ak-Chin had both a boys and girls team entered in the 2022 NABI tournament.

Wesley and Bernardina Gonzales coached the girls, while the boys were coached by Thomas Carlyle and Jose Miguel, Jr. Both teams had a three-game guarantee during pool play, followed by a double-elimination tournament.

They played three back-to-back games Saturday morning, winning all three games and placing first in their pool.

The first games ended in a tie, and the tiebreaker rule was enforced, where a runner is placed on second base and the first team to score wins. They went 8 extra innings in

The Ak-Chin Indian Community (“Community”) is seeking qualified consultants to conduct an update to the Community’s 2003 General Plan. The current General Plan contains goals and policies for land use, transportation, cost of development, the natural environment, and preservation of cultural resources. The selected consultant will partner with Community staff, departments, the membership, and the Council to visualize and develop General Plan Elements and an implementation plan as part of the update. Additionally, the consultant will facilitate Community engagement, present recommendations, and solicit feedback.

I. BACKGROUND

The Community encompasses approximately 33 square miles of land, which designate areas of land for Residential, Public Use, Commercial, Industrial, Agricultural, Preserved Sensitive, and Riparian areas. The Community’s General Plan is the tool for guiding the future of the Community. The General Plan Elements will establish development needs and sets the goals and objectives together with the land use map, to direct future development.

II. PRE-PROPOSAL MEETING AND QUESTIONS

Water Conservation

The Southwestern region of the United States has been subjected to a 22-year long megadrought. A megadrought is defined as an extended drought that lasts more than two decades. In the journal Nature Climate Change, a study was conducted that found since 2000 the southwest has experienced its driest period in 1200 years. The study conducted in Nature Climate Change found past soil moisture contents and snow water content for past time periods by using tree rings throughout North America. With this drought being one of the most severe ever in the southwest, Park Williams, a geographer for UCLA, says it will take multiple wet seasons in order to start repairing the effects of this major drought.

Climate change is a major reason why these drought conditions are worsening. With greenhouse gasses trapping heat in the atmosphere, soil and vegetation are drying out. According to the United States Drought Monitor, 95 percent of the western United States has experienced drought conditions since February of this year. Finally, according to the U.S. Bureau of

Reclamation, two of the largest reservoirs in North America, Lake Mead and Lake Powell, have reached their lowest recorded levels since tracking began.

When it comes to conserving water, small changes can make a big difference. The Arizona Department of Water Resources found that the average Arizona resident uses 146 gallons of water per day, which is 56% higher than the national average. By practicing water conservation, we can significantly lessen our water waste. From the bathroom to the backyard, these tips can help you start conserving in new ways today. How you can make a difference:

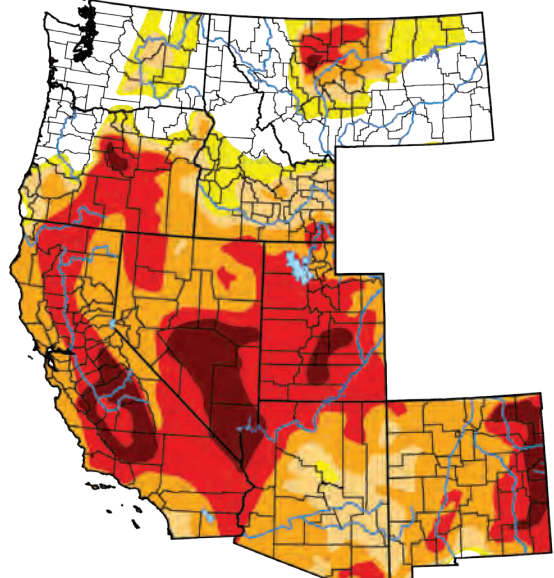
- Know how your landscaping or sprinkler timer works. Decrease watering as weather cools or whenever it rains in your area.
- Only water the lawn when necessary. If you water your lawn and garden, only water in the early mornings or evenings because wind and evaporation are lower.
- Don't over-water native plants. Learn how much water they need and realize that they are

desert plants and will die from too much water.

- Plant grass only where children and pets use it, not just as a decoration.
- Sweep your driveway instead of hosing it down.
- Don't fill your washing machine with water if you don't have a full load of clothes in it.
- Run your dishwasher only when it's full. Do not pre-rinse unless you need to, as most new dishwashers do not require pre-rinsing.
- When cooking, peel and clean vegetables in a large bowl of water instead of under running water.
- Fill your sink or basin when washing and rinsing dishes.
- Only use the garbage disposal when necessary (composting is a great alternative).
- Turn off the water to brush teeth, shave and soap up in the shower. Fill the sink to shave.
- Take 5-minute showers instead of baths. A full bathtub requires up to 70 gallons of water.


